Norman Cromwell, UNL professor of chemistry emeritus, recently was the recipient of the Midwest Award for 1984. Cromwell has spent five decades in cancer research. He is the first UNL faculty member to receive the award in 30 years.

F. Gregory Hayden, UNL professor of economics, is one of three U.S. economists invited to an international conference in Paris ending today. He is presenting a paper charting the future of economics.

The conference on Interdisciplinary Dimensions of Economic Analysis is the culmination of the first year of a new project sponsored by the International Social Science Council. The project is funded by UNESCO and the Bank of Sweden Tercentenary Foundation.

Alan Booth, professor of sociology at UNL, has been named editor of the Journal of Marriage and the Family.

The assignment was made by the governing board of the National Council of Family Relations at its annual meeting in San Francisco.

The journal is the leading scholarly publication for family research and has an international readership. Booth joined the faculty in 1963. He has been director of the Bureau of Sociological Research, has helped organize the Nebraska Annual Social Indicators Survey and has chaired the department of sociology.

Richard Fleming, head of the department of agricultural communications at UNL, has been elected chair of communications administrators in the national

Agricultural Communicators in Education organization.

Army ROTC Cadet **Charles S. Farlow** has become the first UNL cadet to win a United Services Automobile Association scholarship.

Farlow, a senior engineering major from Scottsbluff, recently was awarded the \$1,000 scholarship for academic merit and leadership abilities.

The Nebraska Chapter of Gamma Sigma Delta agricultural honorary presented merit awards to five UNL Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources staff members at its annual initiation and awards banquet recently.

William Splinter, head of the UNL department of agricultural engineering, and **Rollin Schneid-**

er, extension farm safety specialist, received the Award of Merit. **Robert Olson**, professor of agronomy, received the Teaching Award; **Earl Gleaves**, extension poultry specialist, received the Extension Award; and **Roger Mandigo**, professor of animal science, received the Research Award.

Five UNL agronomists received awards from the American Society of Agronomy, the Soil Science of America and the Crop Science Society of America at their joint annual meeting recently.

Virgil Johnson received the ASA International Agronomy Award. The ASA Agronomic Service Award went to the UNL Chancellor **Martin Massengale**. Agronomy professor emeritus **Tom McCalla** received the SSA Distinguished Service Award and **Charles Gardner** received the CSSA Dekalb Pfizer Distinguished Crop Science Career Award. professor **Ralph Clark** was named a Fellow of the ASA.

Johnson, USDA wheat research

leader and UNL professor of agronomy, was recognized for his contributions to wheat improvement internationally.

Massengale's Agronomic Service Award recognizes the effectiveness of programs designed to promote the understanding and use of agronomic science and technology by the public, the government and other organized groups.

The SSA Distinguished Service Award recognizes McCalla's outstanding service to soil science over a period of more than 25 years.

Gardner's CSSA award also recognizes service to crop science over a minimum 25-years period. His research focused on basic quantitative genetic studies and their application to the development and understanding of plant breeding systems for crop improvement.

Clark has devoted his professional career to understanding and expanding the knowledge of mineral nutrition in plants, particularly sorghum and corn.

The first charge against Douglas alleges that he lied under oath to the Legislature's Special Commonwealth Committee, a felony, about his dealing with Marvin Copple, former vice president of Commonwealth Savings Co. The second charge alleges that Douglas obstructed government operations, a misdemeanor,

when he discussed a letter from the FBI with Copple in March 1983. Douglas has denied that he discussed the letter.

Friday, the attorneys will try to narrow the selected group of 24 jurors to 12. Each counsel will eliminate six people. The court must also question and select six more people as possible alternates. The alternate group will be cut to two and the trial will begin.

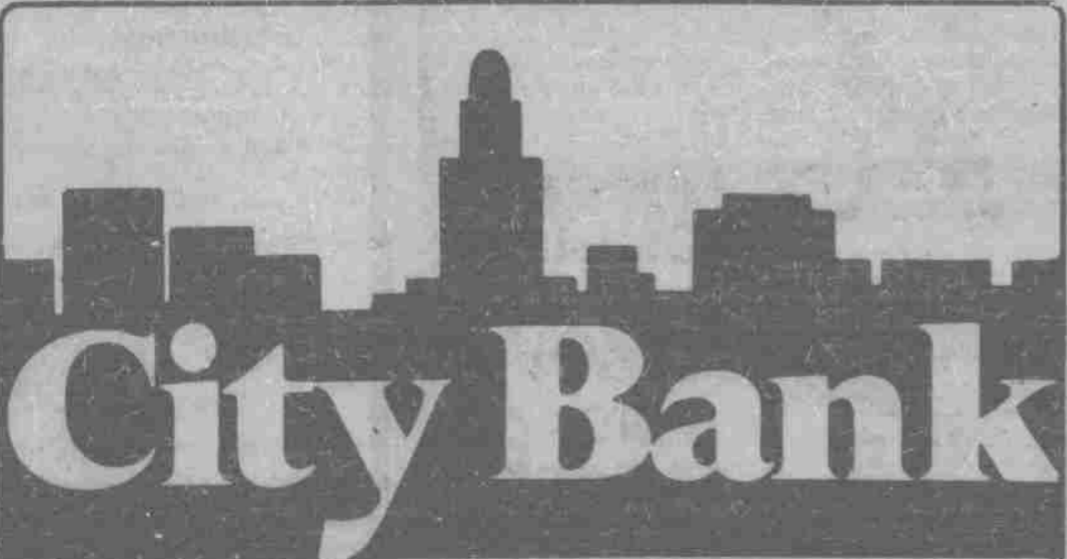

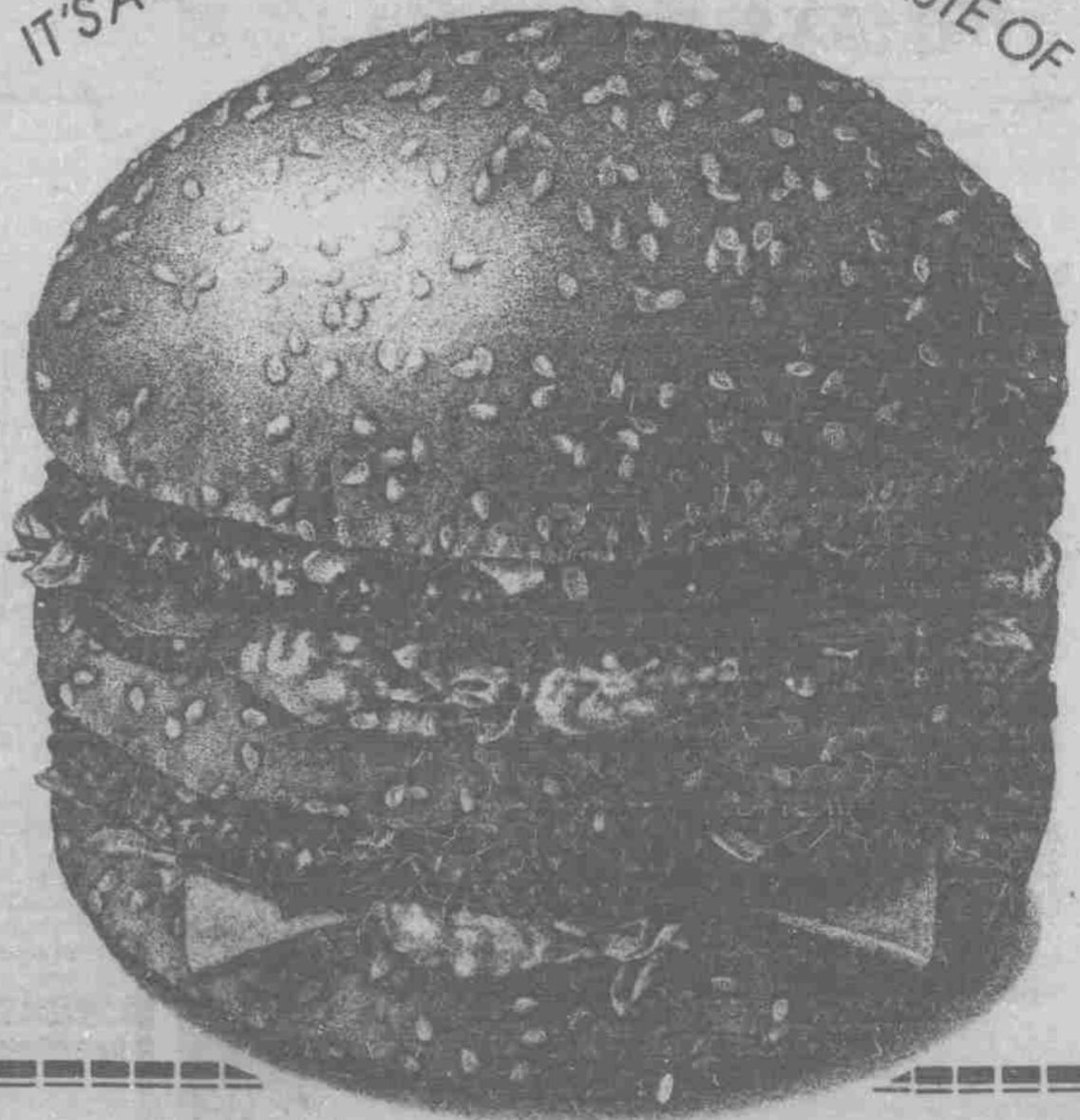
