These statements I make on the authority of Yale men who are no longer in college. I trust that no one who knows me can justly call me a fanatical anti fraternity man, and yet I did not trust myself to pass judgment on this delicate question. I preferred to have as judges men who have a life long interest in the institution—where fraternities are anything but disliked—but who, on the other hand, are not now personally interested in class matters (the most prominent societies here are limited, class affairs)—in short, the most competent as well as impartial judges, and the above remarks are, in substance, their verdict.

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
