The new catalogue has just been received from the printers and contains many things of interest to the students and friends of the university. The register shows a roll of 474 unrepeated names, an increase of fifty over last year, and particularly gratifying is the fact that thirty-five of this increment are enrolled in the college classes. The catalogue makes mention of many improvements that have been made; about 2,000 volumes have been added to the general library, the department libraries have been enlarged, the department of physics, formerly divided between the chemical laboratory and university hall now occupies eight large rooms in Ne braska hall. Other departments have been strengthened in proportion. The catalogue is remarkably concise and business like in make-up and presents a large amount of information in a conveniently condensed form. The typographical appearance contrasts sharply with that of last year's catalogue, and shows that what is cheapest is not always best. We have wondered why cuts of the university buildings have not been printed in our catalogues. We have five good buildings and should show them to those who contemplate attending the university. It is customary among colleges to give cuts of the college buildings, and while THE HESPERIAN does not wish to advocate anything merely because others do it, we think that this is a matter in which we might well imitate other institutions. The U. of N. is so far ahead of the other colleges in the state in the matter of buildings that we might cell advertise the institution a little by making this superi-

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
