## THE Czar ASSASSINATED

Nicholas II. Dies at the  
Hands of His Hidden  
Enemies.

Hand-Grenades of Nitro-Glycine  
Do Most Effectual  
Work,

And Rob Europe of the First  
Autocrat of the Uni-  
versity.

The News Sends a Thrill of Hor-  
ror Through Every Court  
of Europe,

And Elicits Condolence for the  
Czar's Family From All  
Quarters.

The Czaritch To Be Pro-  
claimed Emperor of All the  
Russians To-Day.

## THE PARTIZANS.

PARIS, March 14—1 a. m.—The emperor, Alexander II., and his suite, were assassinated yesterday (Sunday) afternoon while returning from a review of the troops. While the emperor's carriage was proceeding to the winter palace, and when within a short distance of it, a bomb was thrown into the carriage, and instantly exploded, causing a terrible explosion which killed the czar and his suite.
