A MONTH'S WEATHER.

Mr. Dey Tells Everything About It.

From the monthly report of L. M. Dey, who is in charge of the signal service office at this point, it is learned that the mean temperature for July has been 78.8 degrees. The highest mean temperature was reached on the 20th of the month when 89 was indicated. The highest temperature shown by the thermometer was 101 degrees on the 20th and the lowest was 58 degrees on the 26th. The prevailing direction of the wind has been south, and its greatest velocity was twenty-six miles an hour. There were seven clear days, five cloudy days and ten days upon which rain fell. The comparative temperatures were as follows: In 1873 the mean temperature for July was 75 degrees; in 1874 it was 80 degrees, in 1875 it was 74,4 degress; in 1876 it was 75.1 degrees; in 1877 it was 76 degrees; in 1878 it was 79.1 degrees; in 1879 it was 78.7 degrees and in 1880 it was 77.7 degrees. As before stated the mean temperature for July of the present year was 78 degrees.

A Change of Base.


