Secretary Connoyer, of the board of education, has started a crusade to secure the money paid over as volice court fines for the city school fund. The hitch originated in June last, when the law, as Judge Beneke construed it, made drunkenness a state offense. At that time, it will be remembered, the penalty for drunkenness was raised from \$3 and costs to \$10 and costs. Since then about \$250 have accumulated in fines in the hands of Judge Bencke. His idea was to pay this money over to the county treasurer, although be has not yet done so. Under the administration of both Judge Perter and Judge Anderson this money went into the county treasury. Judge Hawes reversed this and deposited the money in the city treasury. Judge Benske took the other view of the matter as before stated. The lawyers disagree as the police coust judges have done, and everybody concerned seems anxious that the case should go into the court where

the question would be permanently decided. City Attorney Manà erson in a written epinion sayst.
