



### OVERFLOW CASES.

#### The Outcome of the Flood of 1881

Heavy Judgments Against the Omaha and Republican Valley Road.

For the past ten days the District court of Saunders county, at Wahoo, has been engaged in trying six cases against the Omaha & Republican Valley Railroad Company for damages caused by a gorge of ice against the bridge of the company across the Platte, near Valley, in the spring of 1881.

By agreement the six cases were tried together, before the same jury, the plaintiffs being represented by Messrs. Connell and Doane, and the railroad company by Messrs. Poppleton and Thurston.

The jury returned their verdict in the several cases yesterday for about the amounts claimed, and aggregating \$14,850.

One of the cases, that of J. P. Brown, had been previously tried in a former town. The judgment, which was for \$5,000, was reversed by the Supreme court, on the grounds of an alleged erroneous instruction. The verdict for Mr. Brown, returned yesterday, was for \$9,000.

It is thought the record on the cases just closed will be permitted to stand, as great pains were taken by the court and counsel to keep the record free from error. Judge Post, who presided at the trial, exhibited great fairness and ability, and receives the highest encomiums from the counsel on both sides.

### THE PEOPLE'S PROTEST.

#### Against the Use of Colorado Sandstone for Street Paving.

Trinidad Asphaltum Demanded.

To His Honor the Mayor and City Council of Omaha, Neb.

We the undersigned owners of real estate within Paving Districts Nos. 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7, in the city of Omaha, being informed that a majority of the Board of Public Works commend as the material to be used in the pavement of said districts a sand stone, from Colorado, on a loose broken stone and sand base with no guarantee as to its durability, at a cost of \$3.40 per yard, therefore do protest against the use of this untried material, and most respectfully, but urgently, request the use of Trinidad Asphaltum on a concrete base, such as is being laid on Douglas street and under the same 3 years guarantee and other agreements at a cost of \$2.98 per yard, or \$3.50 per yard with 10 years guarantee; as the Council may elect.


