BROKE JAIL.

A Midnight Sensation at the Barracks.

Eleven Prisoners "Buck and Gag" the Guard and Escape.

About 10:30 o'clock last evening eleven prisoners, who had all been tried and convicted and were sentenced to a term at the Military prison at Fort Leavenworth, made their escape from the guard house at the barracks, and up to this time but three of them have been recaptured.

The men dug their way out under the foundation, and, seizing the sentinel, bucked and gagged him, after which they made their escape.

The flight was not discovered until 12:30, when the guard was to be changed, and the soldier who had been so violently handled was found in a helpless condition, having remained bucked and gagged for two hours.

A party was at once sent out in all directions to look for the deserters and three of them were found yesterday near Sulphur Springs, north of the city. The rest will no doubt be captured. The men were all under sentence for from two to four years.
