MILLIONS IN IT!

The Assessed Valuation of Douglas County. It Shows an Increase Over that of 1882.

Since the completion of the work of the board of equalization, County Clerk Baumer has been busy preparing a summary of the assessment lists of this county, to be forwarded to the auditor of state as required by law.

The total assessed valuation of real and personal property is \$10,913,724.83, of which \$7,275,165 is realty and \$3,638,559 personalty.

The increase in valuation of real estate in the county, in round numbers is \$1,187,049, but one precinct showing a decrease over the 1882 assessment.

The railroads are taxed for personal property as follows: Chicago & St. Paul Railway, \$8,710,572.82; Union Pacific, 355,721.80; O. & N. W., 5,329.00; O. & S. V., 1,061.90; W. U. Telegraph Company, 1,061.90.
