PROSPECTIVE BEEF WAR. A Blow at Transporting Dressed Beef.

Increased Freight Rates to be Charged for "Chicago" Beef--The Effect it Will Have on the Consumers. There promises to be trouble ahead for the dealers in and shippers of what is known as "Chicago" beef, because of the increased rates of freight which Commissioner Fink, the trunk line adjudicator, has decided it should pay.

Commissioner Fink, in his final report regarding the rates of dressed beef and live stock shipments, gives an extra cost of shipping live stock from Chicago to New York, as agreed upon by the joint executive committee of the railroad pool, as follows: For attendants, food, bedding and yardage, per 100 pounds of live stock, as estimated by the representative of the Grand Trunk, 7 cents; shrinkage of beef while live in transit, 11 pounds per 100 pounds, at 20 cents per pound, 15 cents; total, 22 cents; deduct from value of beef, highest estimate, 7 cents, making the lowest estimate 15 cents.

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O. H. P. BELMONT'S BRIDE. The Story that She Will Sue for a Divorce Revealed.

NEW YORK, R. I., July 2. In grim December last a fashionable wedding took place in this city. The bride was Miss Sallie Whiting, of New York, a grand daughter of the late Judge Swan, of Ohio. The bridegroom was a young and handsome lad, who had just resigned from the navy. His name was Oliver Hazard Perry Belmont, son of August Belmont, the New York banker.

Mr. Belmont, upon his arrival in New York, publicly denied that there was anything between himself and his wife.
