WAYWARD WOMAN. Her Husband Finds Her in a Brothel But Forgives All and Takes Her Back.

Tired of Her Paramour, She Returns Home and Renews Her Vows. Yesterday there was a strange make-up between husband and wife, after a separation of many months. The parties concerned have lived at or near Osceola, in this state, the husband being a young man of prominent family and of prosperous business, while the wife, young, too—hardly more than twenty years of age, is the daughter of a physician, and of rather aristocratic family, too. It seems that she became infatuated with another man, and as the other husband, after being married but a short time, had some trouble in which both were probably at blame, she deserted him, and joined the man with whom she fancied herself more in love than with her husband. This was eight months ago. Since then the husband had been trying to get some trace of her whereabouts, and learning that she was in this city he got Deputy Sheriff Clatterback to help him find her. The latter a night or two ago spied a woman, answering her description, sitting in the park with a man, and following them became so satisfied that she was the one wanted that he informed the anxious husband by telegraph. On the latter's arrival the officer took him to where the wife was. They found her in a well-known house of prostitution, and the man for whom she had forsaken her husband and forgotten sacred vows, fled like a coward. The scene for a time was an exciting one, and the strange meeting between husband and wife was anything but easy for either. He had not come for revenge, however, and he as quickly as possible made this evident to the excited and surprised young woman. He freely confessed to her what he had deemed to be his fault, and argued her to return to his home, as he would freely forgive all. They talked the whole matter over for hours, the wife confessing that she had been untrue, but claiming that she had bestowed her endearments on no other man beyond the one, for when she had deserted her husband. She had tired of the life of sin, and yet she feared her husband would harm the man who had broken up his home. She made him pledge himself that he would not even prosecute him, and various other confessions, expressions of repentance and mutual pledges passed between them, the talk lasting until break of day, the officer in the meantime being in waiting to take any such official action as a change of circumstances might necessitate. Peace was made with the coming of morning, and all terms of the treaty agreed upon. The party repaired to breakfast at the hotel, and took the morning's train for home again, with the avowed determination of together living down the ugly reced of the past.
