WASHINGTON, July 10.—No one laughs now at the Washington monument. The day of its being a subject for ridicule is over for ever.

The work of building is going rapidly on, and it is expected that it will be completed within two years at least.

It is now thirty-five years since the Washington monument was begun, and eighty-three since its plan was conceived.

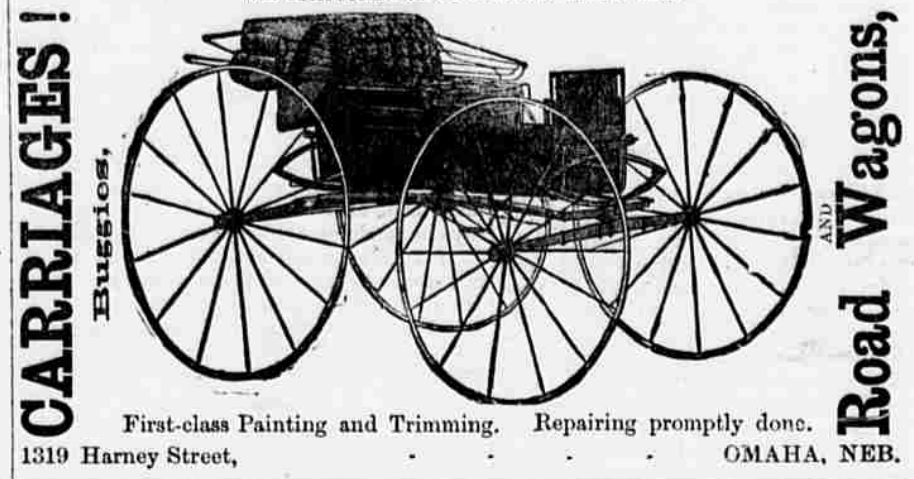
