ARMY ORDERS.

Second Lieutenant William B. Reynolds, Fourth infantry, having complied with instructions contained in orders No. 184, dated Fort Sidney, Neb., September 18, 1883, will rejoin his proper station.

Second Lieutenant E. H. Browne, Fourth infantry, A. C. S., Fort Niobrara, Neb., will proceed from that post to Fremont, Neb., on duty connected with the subsistence department, and on completion thereof will rejoin his proper station.

To comply with paragraph 4, general orders No. 69, Adjutant General office, Washington, August 1, 1883, the following disposition is ordered of ambulances and spring wagons at the several posts in this department, viz:

At Forts Niobrara and Omaha, one ambulance will be retained and all others serviceable will be transferred to Omaha depot.

At Forts Bridger, Douglas, Laramie, McKinney, Robinson, Russell, Steele, Sidney and Washakie, one ambulance for the sick and one spring wagon will be retained, and all the others serviceable will be transferred to Cheyenne depot, Wyo.

At each post in the department all unserviceable ambulances and spring wagons will be inventoried for inspection and the inventories at once forwarded for the action of the department commander with a view to condemnation and sale.

The ambulances and spring wagons herein ordered transferred to depots will be sent in by contract transportation unless public transportation is available for the purpose.

Post quartermasters will notify transportation contractors in time to secure transportation before October 15th, 1883.

All vouchers for rewards for apprehension of deserters, and for recovery of lost and stolen animals in this department, will hereafter be transmitted to the chief quartermaster of the department to be settled when funds are received for the purpose.

Funds for those purposes will only be furnished by the treasury department when estimated on a basis of actual indebtedness.
