There are now in the county jail eight prisoners, all men, or at least males, there being the same noticeable youthful average as is discernible in most of the jails of the country.

"What do you feed them?" asked the man of jailer Schurz. "Well, I'll tell you, I give the boys meat and potatoes, molasses and bread, three times a day. I give them coffee twice a day, too."

"Don't some of the prisoners grumble anyway?" "Yes, some of them grumble sometimes when first put in, that is if they are not regulars, but the old-timers who have been in other jails, and know who sort of fare they generally get, put them, and tell them if they kick at us the fare they get here they ought to be kicked. Dr. Cross, when he was in here, said I was feeding the boys too strong, giving them too much meat for their own good, but I believe in feeding them well. I tell you men are like cattle. You open up a lot of cattle, and try to starve them and they get restless and ugly, and make a break every now and then, but if you feed them well they stay more content. Men are a good deal so, and they feel better satiated, and are easier to handle.

"Of course you give them napkins and silver forks?" "Well, hardly. Every one gets a tin plate, a spoon and a tin cup. If they also get a tin fork, that is, every man has a towel of his own, and there is a big bath-tub where he can wash when he pleases. Every man sleeps alone, and has to sweep out his cell every morning. Two men are detailed every week to clean up the hall, table etc., and every Sunday morning every prisoner is given a clean shirt. If he does not have one of his own the county furnishes one. Even with these arrangements it is difficult to keep the prisoners clean, but they seem healthy and hearty.
