THE GREAT GENERAL. Winfield Scott Hancock in Omaha Yesterday Morning.

THE NEW CHURCH.

The English Lutheran Church Approaching Completion. The new English Lutheran church, located at the corner of Harney and Sixteenth streets, when completed, will be one of the most imposing church buildings in the city of Omaha.

A Bee reporter met Dr. Stelling, the pastor, last evening and inquired as to when the edifice would be completed and ready for occupancy, and was informed that the congregation hoped to be able to use the basement of the building by the first of February, and that the audience room would be ready for use by Easter Sunday.

The roof is now on, the floors have been laid, and the finishing work will be pushed right along. The contract price is \$30,500 for building the church, which does not include the furniture, which will probably swell these figures to \$40,000.

All work so far is paid for, and it is desired and intended that when the building is completed and furnished that it will be entirely free from debt.

THE BIGGEST THING YET.

The Trial of the Banner Stand-pipe Upon the Millard Hotel.

A Large Crowd Present to Witness the Test, which was Entirely Satisfactory.

At 2 o'clock yesterday the fire department, under the supervision of Chief Engineer Butler, made a test of the Bruner stand-pipe, recently erected on the south side of the Millard hotel.

There was an immense crowd of people congregated in the streets below to witness the workings of the first stand-pipe erected in this state.

Promptly at the hour named the firemen, each with a coil of hose on his shoulder, ascended the ladder attached to the stand-pipe, which leads directly on to the roof, and operations were commenced. Hose was laid from the hydrant at the corner of Douglas and Thirteenth streets, and also from the corner of Douglas and Twelfth streets; both being connected to the bottom of the stand-pipe.

The working of the stand-pipe was perfectly satisfactory to the proprietors of the house, the patentee, the chief engineer and all parties who witnessed it. It is a grand good thing for large blocks, and more of them will probably be put up at once in this city.
