FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The senate committee on military affairs has reported favorably on the resolution to remove the injunction of secrecy from the members of the court martial that tried Fitz John Porter and it will be passed before the Porter bill is taken up for consideration. The court to which this applies was composed of Major General David Hunter, who presided, Major General E. A. Hitchcock, and Brigadier Generals Rufus King, B. H. Prentiss, James B. Ricketts, Silas Casey, James A. Garfield, Nathan Buford and J. P. Slough. Gen. Joseph Holt acted as Judge Advocate General. Of this board only three Hunter, Ricketts and Holt are now living, and they all are in Washington at present. The resolution is said to have been offered at their request, as they felt that the passage of a bill restoring Porter will be accepted as a condemnation of their action. They want to give their reasons for his conviction. It is said by Logan's friends that he has obtained new and convincing evidence against Porter, which he will use in a speech when the bill comes up. It is supposed that this consists of statements made by Holt, Hunter and Ricketts regarding the original court martial.

THE ARMY RETIRED LIST.

The house committee on military affairs has reported favorably upon the bill to provide a retired list for privates and for non-commissioned officers of the army who have served faithfully for 30 years or more. The same committee has reported another bill authorizing the president to confer brevet rank upon officers of the army who shall distinguish themselves in Indian wars.

General Horatio G. Wright, chief of engineers, will be retired from the army this week, after forty years of active service, and will be succeeded by General Newton, who has had charge of the Hell Gate improvements at New York.

THE STAR ROUTE INQUIRY.

REGULAR PRESS DISPATCHES.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—Ex-Postmaster General James and ex-Attorney General MacVagh were examined to-day by the Springer committee relative to expenditures in the department of justice in the prosecution of the star route cases. James said his attention was first specially called to star route matters by ex-United States Senator George E. Spencer of Alabama, and other well informed gentlemen. It was their belief that millions of dollars had been wasted in unnecessary "star" service, much of which never had been performed, and was procured by improper measures. It was also maintained that an honest, thorough investigation would render practical great retrenchments without detracting to the mail service, which could not only make the postoffice department self-sustaining but would yield a respectable revenue to the treasury. Continuing James said: "That I entertained such views was more or less well known. The publicity given them led to the fact that while in the city of New York when asked by Stephen V. Dorney to certify in my official capacity to a large number of papers connected with the contract office of the post office department I refused to do so, which may account for the bitter opposition to my appointment to a cabinet position which developed in certain quarters. I went to Washington on the night of the 2d of March 1881 in answer to a telegraphic dispatch from Whitlaw Reid which I understood to represent Garfield's desire. On the third I called on him in company with Reid. The latter said in substance addressing General Garfield that he had asked me to come on as his General Counsel in New York. Reid had told me it was in reference to the same suggestion of my name for postmaster-general, that I had said that if the treasury department was likely to come to New York I did not want to be in the way and that he, Reid, had assured me that that was now settled. General Garfield addressing me said: 'That is absolutely settled. The treasury department cannot go to New York.' Reid continuing said he had told me General Garfield expected to get on satisfactorily and without friction with both factions in New York and hoped my appointment, if made, would help to that end, but wished to know whether in case a controversy should be forced upon him he could so serve if I were made postmaster-general that my national affiliations in New York would not interfere with my hearty support of his administration. General Garfield said: 'Yes, that is about it,' and I then replied: 'Such a contingency, in my judgment, will not arise, but if it should, if I accept your nomination, I must, as is forced upon him, be loyal to the president or resign.' General Garfield said: 'That is satisfactory.'

Two Pennsylvania Local Celebrities Make Wrecks of Each Other.

DANVILLE, Pa., March 5.—A prize fight with hard gloves took place here at a late hour last night between Tom Jones and William T. Speiser, two local pugilists. The ring was constructed in an unused building, and fifty men witnessed the battle which was according to the rules of the London prize ring. Both fighters wore middle weights. Fifteen rounds were fought and the exhibition was most brutal, both men being dreadfully punished. Their faces were horribly disfigured and their bodies torn and bruised. In the fifteenth round and last, the men were hardly able to walk to the scratch. Jones was stronger, however, and led, planting his left on Speiser's mouth. A clinch ensued and then the men hammered each other and finally fell together in a heap. Jones claimed that Speiser struck him a foul and a general fight seemed imminent. The referee, however, decided that no foul had been committed and called time for the sixteenth round. Jones did not go to the scratch and Speiser was declared the winner. The fight lasted one hour and twenty minutes.

RAILROAD RATES.

THE TRANS-CONTINENTAL POOL.

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE BEE.

CHICAGO, March 5.—On February 6 the announcement was made that verbal notice of withdrawal from the Transcontinental association was given by the Union Pacific road ninety days prior to that time, and had been considered final by that line, and that it refused to be bound by the rules of the association after that day. The road claimed that its notice given at Topeka was sufficient, while the commissioner claimed that there was no such notice on record. It seems that the Union Pacific was convinced that its notice did not hold good because it did not cease to be a party to the association, and is still reporting to it. It did, however, give written notice of withdrawal on February 24, which will expire May 24.

A NEW ARRANGEMENT.

G. F. Goddard, general traffic manager of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad, arrived in the city yesterday, and during the day held a lengthy conference with Commissioner Midgely, of the Southwestern Railway association. A plan was agreed to providing for an arrangement for the division of through rates on competitive business between the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe road and its competitors in southern Kansas south of the main line. The Southwestern Railway association agrees to make through rates with the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad, which will be divided proportionately between the two whenever the latter has to meet any rates made by its competitors. When a restoration is made the Southwestern association will make the west bound rate, while the Santa Fe road will make the east bound rate. The report that an arrangement was to be effected between these two organizations similar to that between the roads in the Western Trunk Line association at Council Bluffs was announced. New through rates and divisions will go into effect in a few days. There will be no system of through billing as might be imagined.

THE U. P. ANNUAL.

REGULAR PRESS DISPATCHES.

BOSTON, March 5.—The stockholders of the Union Pacific railway held their annual meeting to-day. The old board of directors was re-elected, including August Schell and Solon Humphries. Hugh Riddle, of Chicago, and James A. Rummell, Springfield, were elected to fill their places. The annual report to the stockholders gives the length of the road as 1,820 miles; gross earnings for the year \$1,022,541; operating expenses including taxes \$10,305,540; surplus earnings \$10,948,001; interest and dividends collected on invested securities \$2,086,682, making a total of surplus earnings of \$12,714,683; total payments \$11,492,809, showing a surplus for the year of \$1,261,773. The funded debt table shows a balance outstanding of \$84,905,332. Compared with the year previous there is a decrease in earnings of \$1,821,342. The aggregate amount of passenger and freight traffic for 1883 exceeded the amount for the previous year, but the diminished earnings are caused by a reduction of rates. The number of passengers carried was 1,185,984, an excess of 21 per cent, and of tons of freight carried 2,589,365, an excess of 24 per cent over 1882.

The business depression in Colorado for the greater part of the year, together with the division of Montana traffic with the Northern Pacific railroad and the entire division from our lines after September 15 of the passenger business between Oregon and Washington territory and the east caused a large loss in passenger business on the Union Pacific division. But for a reduction of rates in Colorado and Utah arising from competition with rival lines and the failure to agree upon rates the gross earnings of the company for the past year would have been legally in excess of the year previous. The latter of these causes has now been remedied and with a maintenance of the present rates and continued increase of traffic the gross and net earnings for 1884 should show very favorably when compared with the past year.

Sales of the company's lands in 1883 amounted to a larger sum than for any previous year since the sales commenced and exceeded the sales of last year by the sum of \$2,308,839. The total number of acres sold during the year was 1,160,349 for the gross sum of \$4,081,133. The number of purchasers was 3,814 who bought at an average price of \$3.50 per acre. All lands granted the company have been sold for a distance of 200 miles west of the Missouri river.

THE CROUNSE MURDER.

JACKSON, Mich., March 5.—Important and authentic information of a startling character relative to the Crouch tragedy was to-day developed. A complete and seemingly conclusive chain of circumstantial evidence is in the hands of the officials which seems unaccountable on any other theory than that Dan Holcomb, Judd Crouse and Jas. Foy were the actual perpetrators of the crime. Only a portion of this evidence can at present be made public. It will go to show that the crime was carefully and deliberately planned fully two months before its actual commission and that the chief conspirator was Dan Holcomb. Holcomb was largely indebted to Jacob Crouse and had tried hard to borrow more money from him about two months before the murder, but failed. The old man used bitter words regarding Holcomb's mismanagement as a farmer and the result was that the two were barely on speaking terms for a good while before the murder was committed. It is believed Holcomb and Judd would both be practically disinherited in favor of Henry White's child, which would have been born had it not been unfortunate mother been permitted to live one or two weeks longer. The prosecution will aim to prove that a special motive for the murders existed two months before their commission, that the deed was then carefully planned, that the murder and robbery of Polly was one of the prearranged blinds; and that Foy was an actual participant. Judd was examined to-day on a charge of shooting Detective Brown and the latter bore a rigid examination of over two hours, detailed the shooting and events connected therewith and calmly told the story. He thought Judd Crouch was the man who shot him but did not think the other man was McCallum. The two roads away after the shooting. Judd's counsel alluded to him as the "poor boy" and the crowd greeted the expression with jeers, and whistles and an adjournment was had.

THE WINNETKA BUTCHERY.

CHICAGO, March 5.—The coroner's jury to-day concluded the investigation of the Winnemka murder. The verdict finds that Mr. and Mrs. Wilson came to their deaths by violent means at the hands of a person or persons unknown, that the jury believe the evidence points suspicion upon Neil McKeeague. The verdict in no way alters the status of the case, two indictments for murder having been found against McKeeague prior to the coroner's investigation.

CHICAGO MARKETS.

THE FEATURES OF A DAY.

CHICAGO, March 5.—The markets displayed a fair degree of activity early in the day, and prices were firmer all round, but trading grew more tame and limited toward the close and there ensued a proportionate depression in prices. A good business was transacted in wheat, chiefly on local account, and the feeling was somewhat unsettled, with fluctuations within a moderate range. Foreign advices quoted wheat quiet, but firmer for cargoes off coast. Receipts continue small. The market opened strong and 1/2 to 3/4 higher, but later under rather free speculative offerings, declined 1/4 to 3/4, then rallied about 1/4 under a better demand, with "shorts" covering, and finally closed easier and 1/4 lower than the closing figures on change yesterday. Corn rules irregular and the feeling is unsettled. A moderate business was transacted but at times the market ruled quiet. Receipts were smaller, and about 28 per cent inspected contract corn. The market opened 1/2 higher, and declined under free offerings about 3/4, rallied 1/2, and finally closed about 1/4 under the price of yesterday.
