Stocks.-At the Stock Exchange there was great excitement in Reading and Jersey Central, and a marked depression in the prices in these stocks. The transactions in Reading reached the enormous total of 115,000 shares; of Jersey Central 12,378 shares transferred. Reading opened at 45, then broke to 411. Jersey Central went from 821 to 77. The heavy salling in the stock was brought about by the reports that the Reading was financially embarassed, and would have to sacrifice some securities in its treasury to meet a pressing demand; that the company had been called upon to take up Jersey Central stock held here and at Philadelphia, and could not respond at the last moment. The report was denied, and Jersey Central advanced to 801; Reading to 425 The bears, however, soon broke both the stocks again. In the final dealings, Jersey Central rallied to 791; Reading to 43}. In other active shares, the market was comparatively steady throughout, except a slight decline early in the day, closing firm. Low-priced south-west shares were steady. Trunk lines were strong on reports that new proceedings had been agreed upon, and that the official announcement of the agreement would be made shortly. It was stated that the roads had decided to abide by the decision of arbitrators. Union Pacific was strong, attributable to dispatches from Chicago which stated that the Burlington & Quincy and Tripartite conference had been harmonious, and that the questions under consideration were nearer settlement than at any time since negotiations were opened. 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
