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STATE JOTTINGS

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"SURRENDER OR DIE."

A Lively Time at Battle Creek, Mason County.

On Thursday last week a party of a half dozen headed by Lawson Miller of Battle Creek for the purpose of provoking a quarrel with Troy Hale, whom Miller claimed had beaten him unfairly in a horse race or horse hand of some kind.

Both Miller and Hale are somewhat noted as jockeys. Hale was apprised of their purpose and kept out of their way.

The party remained in town all day Thursday and Friday without accomplishing their purpose.

Occasionally one of the party would meet Hale on the street and give him an intimation of their purpose, but Hale declined to be drawn into a quarrel.

Exasperated by their failure, the crowd on Saturday filled up with liquor and became very belligerent, and tried to run the town in a noisy cow-boy fashion, brandishing their fire-arms in a threatening way.

They did a great deal of damage in a bar-room and assaulted a man named Herman Hogrebe, an indefinite citizen, and severely one of them, beating him severely over the head with a revolver.

This last act aroused the long-suffering citizens to a sense of their danger, and a party of about twenty-five armed themselves with shotguns and prepared to capture the riotous crowd.

Heard by E. J. Hale and the constable the party started out with guns loaded and primed, and the latter shouted "Surrender or die!" Miller yielded as also did the others, but one of the number (Mr. Hale) coming in where Miller was, and not knowing he had surrendered, brandished his revolver, when a dozen guns were pointed at him.

He dodged down behind a counter and saved himself. It was a moment of peril for him, as there were cries of "shoot him!" he was ordered to hold up his hands. He did so, but discreetly kept his head below.

It was a marvel that the citizens refrained from shooting, and a credit to their judgment that they committed no act of violence. When they were all in the custody of the citizens steps were at once taken to prosecute the offenders.

Miller was taken to the jail, and on Sunday afternoon a conjuncture was sent in for him. He went out and prosecuted the case on Monday before Justice Rose, Brown, of Madison, defending.

They were all found guilty of the various offenses charged. The law-abiding citizens of Battle Creek determined not to allow such proceedings to go unpunished.

On the 18th Lawson Miller was brought to Norfolk by Constable Phillips and arraigned before Justice Gerecke, on a charge of venue from Thos. Rus, of Bat Creek, and pleaded guilty to an assault upon Herman Hogrebe and was fined \$100 and costs. This is the last of the cases growing out of the disturbance.

He Had the True Railroad Instinct. Ashburn's Telegraph.

"The most remarkable accident in my experience," said Superintendent Couch in answer to the question, "happened on the Newcaste road to the track-master. He was running down grade on a hand car and making fast time. The last glow of twilight was falling when he was in the scene. Suddenly the man saw the sheen of the two cylinder heads of a locomotive. The light falling on their bright surfaces tended to disclose them first of all. Realizing that the engine was close on him, and that what he did must be done quickly, he sprang from his hand car and plunged into a high embankment. He struck on a pile of stones and sustained severe, but not fatal, injuries. Curious to know what train had been at that point at that hour, he made inquiry, and found that there was no train. The cylinder heads that he supposed he saw were dimmer rails. Two sections of men were returning home from work, walking on a higher side of the track with their dinner pails in hand, and the waning light fell on the pails in such a manner as to give them the appearance of the cylinder heads of an engine. It was a curious accident, but it showed that the track-master had the instinct of a true railroad man. There was no time to wait and investigate, for the engine would have had proven to be an engine, it would have been overrunning too late."
