Thereupon, Senator Manderson, Mayor Boyd, J. M. Woolworth, and several other gentlemen met last evening at the rooms of the Omaha club and agreed upon a programme that will be carried out to-day. In short, s committee of five young men from the Omsha club were appointed to make all necessary arrangements to give the distinguished guests a drive through the city and then dine them at the Paxton hotel. In the meantime a reception is to be held at the Omaha club rooms, where all the members of that organization and other citizens will be given an opportunity to meat the sec. etary of war.

Mr. Endicott will be met at the train this morning by Gen. O. O. Howard, and taken, with his wife and daughter, to the general's residence, corner of Chicago and Twenty-record streets, for breakfast, they having previously accepted an invitation from Gen. Howard to dine with
