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FORCING THE ISSUE: Periodical developments in the political affairs of Canada show a perturbed condition suggesting that there must sooner or later be a radical change in the political character and relations of the dominion.

FOR FREE SHIPS: In one way and another New England, the cradle of the protection policy, is showing a remarkable change of sentiment regarding that policy in all its forms.

WHAT TO DO WITH THE SOUTHERN Utes of Colorado is a problem perplexing both houses of congress. The people of Colorado are clamoring for the removal of those Indians to a reservation set aside for them in Utah, and there is a disposition on the part of the aborigines to accept the condition.

THE BEHEMIAN oats sprind has been worked recently upon the farmers in New York state, and last week James H. Batean, a leading farmer in Greene county, New York, was beaten out of \$5,000 on the gold brick swindle with the Indiana attachment.

THE opening of spring navigation on the great lakes has a broad significance to Omaha and Nebraska. Although the water route of lake Superior is five hundred miles distant, it is likely to operate from now until the close of navigation as a club over the heads of the Chicago roads in fixing freight rates from Omaha to the seaboard.

THE board of trade of Superior has gone to the expense of sending throughout the state printed copies of resolutions recently adopted by that body. The resolutions express the opinion that "the interests of the state are vastly more concerned in the interstate rate for transportation than the local rate."

THE CASE OF IDAHO: The purpose of the minority of the committee on territories of the house to antagonize legislation for the admission of Idaho is promoted wholly by partisan considerations. The pretext for the opposition is that the proposed constitution disfranchises persons without giving them an opportunity to be heard in defense against offenses charged, but not proved.

RECENT experiments confirm the assertions of geologists that a vast area of water underlies the semi-arid sections of western Dakota, which can be utilized by means of artesian wells to irrigate the land. It will require but trifling artificial aid in addition to the natural moisture, to render a large portion of the country secure from the ravages of drought.

THE execution of the twenty-year seal fisheries contract will add six hundred thousand a year to the government's receipts over the terms of the old contract. Which goes to prove that the administration is a first class business one.

THE seed wheat commission of North Dakota has retired from business. The New Orleans seed which it printed so liberally in the legislature failed to take root, and the members wisely concluded that there was no excuse for their existence as an official body.

THE fact that the Mormon legislature of Utah seriously attempted to substitute territorial laws for congressional enactments governing elections shows that the recent Gentile victories have driven the political leaders of the church to the ragged edge of lunacy. As a political machine the church has lost its terrors.

STATISTICS of imports and exports for the first seven months of the fiscal year show a handsome balance of trade in favor of the country. The value of exports over imports amounts to ninety-two million dollars, and the total for the fiscal year indicates an increase over the preceding year of about one hundred and thirty millions.

THE BRIDGE, viaduct and new depots are exhibiting cheerful evidence of vitality. Winter's attempt to linger in the lap of spring has met with the freezing reception it deserved.

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
