A HERO AND HIS WIFE.

Fighting a Fire Which Threatened a Big Powder Magazine.

Seven hundred barrels of powder stored in the magazine on Governor's island narrowly escaped being blown up by a fire, which started at 8 o clock yesterday morning and was extinguished only by the heroic efforts of Sergeant Roche and his wife, who have charge of the government property, says a Boston dispatch to the New York World. Some men who landed on the island on Sun-day built a fire which spread to the dry grass and during the night assumed dangerous proportions. At 4 a. m., the line was far reaching and was approaching

the powder magazine.

Sergeant Roche and his wife turned out of bed and sought to extinguish the fire by throwing water upon it. This was a hard and very slow job, and they had to give it up. Then they tried to beat it out with with mats and other things. They were all alone in the work, and as they saw that they could not stay the flames they became frightened. It was doubtful whether they could manage to make their escape safely. They were becoming exhousted and about 8 o'clock Sergt. Roche manage to notify the police. The police launch patcol, with Officers Dearing and Russell and a man named Miller on board, was sent to their assistance. Upon landing they went to work with a will, but none too soon, for the flames were then not far from the magazine. The Roches, although almost exhausted after four hours of hard and continuous fighting, assisted them. All the force was centered in the vicinity of the magazine, and after an hour or more of beating with wet mats and throwing on buckets of water the immediate danger was overcome. Further work, however, was necessary before all the fire was extinguished. It was a narrow escape. The island would certainly have been torn to pieces had the magazine exploded, and the other damage that would have been done can only be
