NEW YOUK, August 4.-Three bearded men with military bearing, their faces being seared by exposure to a tropical sun, arrived at the Grand hotel yesterday evening. They were Rear Admiral William P. Mc-Cann, Licutenant Kennedy and Licutenant Osterhaus of the United States navy. They came from Colon on the Pacific Mall steamer Newport, which reached her port yesterday. Rear Admiral McCann, when seen by a reporter, said : "The Peruvian people, one and all, keep aloof from the terrible struggle which is going on in Chili. The civil war in Chili will probably progress until the government opains some new men-of-war from Europe. A opular uprising that proves successful genallyprogresses. Delays and maction are notto prove fatal. The end of the war one way or the other would be a boon to the country as well as to the cause of peace and order. It is difficult, nowever, at a distance to understand the bitterness of feeling that exists between the opposing sides. Our own civil war never brought out such an intensity of rage and mallee. The wealthy, aristocratic class is generally on the side of the revolu-tionists. The official class is led by President Baimaceda. "The mass of the people-the potos, the peoples-follow the lead of their superiors in peones — follow the lead of their superiors in the social system, according to the province in which they live. The people, as we under-stand the word, have precious little to do in Chill but to do as they are directed. The re-ports from the country which have appeared in the New York papers have often been greatly exaggerated. Of course the Latin people of South America conduct affairs dif-ferent from the Anglo-Saxon race. There is not much sentiment displayed towards any-one who sticks by his party. Balmaceda has locked up those who shout viva el congreso' in the streets of Valparaiso and Santiago, and the congressional party have suppressed the the congressional party have suppressed the adherents of the government in Taranaca. "The American navy made a splendid show on the coast. Three ships like the Balti-more, the Charleston and the San Francisco are a credit to any marine power. The Unit-ed States navy was treated respectfully and courteously by both sides. The Itata did not land a single rife. It was a great disappoint-ment to the revolutionary party to lose the arms.
