Pass Through Omaha. Mr. Sol Smith Russell, the well known actor, and his company of players stopped for luncheon at the Millard hotel yesterday, en route from Lincoln to Sloux City, where they appeared last evening in Kidder's new play, "Peaceful Valley." After finishing his menl Mr. Russell was seen for a few minutes

in the parlors of the hotel. Mr. Russell off the stage might easily be mistaken for a clergyman, but never for an actor. From his quiet and reserved demeanor in private, his funny and witty say-ings on the stage, make a person wonder if he has not forgotten himself. He has been noting for twenty-eight years, and yet he is

He was a drummer boy in war times, and found himself in Cairo, III., where he joined the stock company of the Dellance theater in 1862. He played utility parts, sang songs between acts and played the snare drum in the orchestra—all for \$6 a week. Then Russell went to DeBar's theater in St. Louis, and to Nashville and to other stock com panies. A few years later he joined the Berger family. A good many people think Sol Smith Russell was developed from the raw material by this organization. He wasn't. He was an actor of experience, but of pronounced youthfuiness before that. Then he went to the Chestnut Street theater, Philadelphia, to Daly's, New York, and to the Boston museum, where he played Whiliam Warren's parts. He first went starring in 1880 under the management of Mr. F. A. Berger, and his first play was "Edgewood Folks." Then he appeared in "Pa," then in "Folix Mc-Cusick," next in "Bewitched," then "A Poor Relation." His last play before "Peaceful Valley" was "The Tale of a Coat," written for Mr. Russell by Boucleault. Now he comes in the success of his lifetime, written by Kidder, entitled "Peaceful Valley." Mr. Berger, manager for Mr. Russell, said that he (Mr. Russell) was compelled to read a great many plays before he could get one to suit him. The actor is a firm believer in easy natural methods and he always presents clean plays, and his comedy is of the kind that may have here and there a tear in it. Still Russell is not satisfied with his present success. He has in his mind the ideal of a certain great character, which he hopes to

THE TERRORISTS OF RUSSIA.

Kennan, the Siberian Traveler, Tells How Their Organizations Grow.

CHICAGO, III., Oct. 23.-[Special to THE Ben.]-The revolutionary societies of Russia are not recruited by any form of proselyting, according to George Kennan, the well known traveler. They are furnished with recruits by the czar himself.

"The moderate liberals," said Mr. Kennan, "form the primary school from which is developed the revolutionists, the terrorists and the various other societies in Russia which have for their object the modification or the complete overthrow of the autocracy. It is a mistage to suppose that a movement which includes almost the extremes of Russian society originates in any way from the efforts of agitators. The government develops its own terrorists. So determined is the ezar in opposition to all forms of liberal thought and political innovation that he maintains an elaborate system of espionage which enters not only into every man's public acts and utterances but looks after the minutest details of his private life. "Suppose, for instance, a lot of young fel-

lows at one of the universities, with the idea of broadening their views on the subject of pontical economy, meet together to read and discuss the works of Herbert Spencer and John Stuart Mill. The fact is duly recorded by the ponce, and every utterance in these discussions which is not rigidly conservative in its tone is noted down, together with the name of the offender. Over this list of names is placed a word which may best be trans-lated 'unworthy.' Then suppose some young man, a little more audacious than his com-panions, says something a little too liberal. It is duly carried to the authorities by spies, and he finds himself under arrest charged, perhaps, with plotting against the govern-ment. But the matter doesn't stop here. Probably every man who comes under the designation of 'unworthy' will also be thrown into prison. These latter may not be sus-pected of complicity in the supposed plot, but the Russian method in such cases is to seize every one who may by any possibility know something about the treasonable design. They are taken out of prison from day to day, subjected to searching cross-examina-tions and returned. When this has gone on for some time, and those students who are not charged with crime of any sort have lain in vermin infected prisons for many months, in vermin infected prisons for many months, they naturally become embittered and their political opinions, which were at first quite mild and purely theoretical, become pronounced and assume the concrete form of opposition to a political system of whose workings they have had a practical demonstration. They may become liberals, men who still favor a centralized sovernment with moderfavor a centralized government with moderate changes. They may join those who want the autocracy applished by peaceful methods or they may enter the ranks of the terrorists whose ideas of referm were illustrated in the assassination of the present

czar's predecessors.
"But take another case. A private citizen who is suspected of having friends who are engaged in some revolutionary moment is taken in hand by the authorities and examined. Because he doesn't wish to betray his friends or very often because he knows nothing to ten, he is returned to prison from day to day until the authorities despair of getting anything out of him. Then, without any form of trial, on the order of the governor, who is virtually given the authority of dictator in provinces supposed to contain revolutionists, he is sent for a term of years to some prison in Siberia. This is done partly as a punishment for his refusal to disclose the information he is suspected of pos-sessing and partly with the idea that if his mind contains any revolutionary germs they may die for want of the nourishment they would receive in the infected province.

"Perhaps he has a wife and child who are entirely dependent upon him for support. He is left the butter alternative of leaving He is left the butter alternative of leaving them to starve or of taking them into exile with him, for this, the dictator, with cruel mercy, permits. Naturally the wife prefers to share her husband's exile. Then the three, father, mother and child, are put into the first caravan on its way to Siberia among criminals of the worst class, the scum of the great cities of Russia and the march begins. As the criminals march the march begins. As the criminals march with manucles the carayan makes only about eighty miles per week. At the stopping places along the route there is absolutely as privacy and his wife is compelled to paso twenty-four hours of every day in unspeak-able surroundings. At the end of three years' exile wife and child have succumbed to the ravages of typhoid fever contracted in damp, fitthy prisons. Then he is liberated and re turns to find his home destroyed and business ruined and in his heart is the ineffaceable memory of the sufferings of the wife and child whose grave he left in pleak Siberia. Add to all this the fact that he feels nimself always under the eyes of hired spies, for the government never relaxes surveillance of such a man. He is ready to resort to any method of warfare against a system under which he has suffered and lost all that made life worth living. He finds other men who

have suffered as he has and they meet each other necessarily in secret. "By this process terrorist societies are formed. They proceed upon the theory that the government is to be frightened into re-

form by threats and assassinations. "It is not, however, by emissaries of these societies that all violent assaults upon the government and its representatives are made, "Just before starting on a second visit to Siberia." said Mr. Kennan, "I saw in the New York Herald a dispatch from St. Petersourg stating that a young girl of Odessa had asked for an audience with Colonel Katanski, the chief of gendarmes in that city, and had attempted to kill him but was disarmed and placed under arrest. stated that this Colonel Katanski had taker a very active part in the effort of the government to stamp out the revolutionists in Odessa and the inference was made that the

girl had been appointed by them to assassin-"While I was in one of the stopping places for prisoners on the frontier of eastern Russia, the girl passed through with a number of political prisoners on her way to the Siberian mines. Then for the first time I learned the truth about her. Her name was Marie Kuiuzhnaya and in a wholesale arrest of people in Odessa she was held by the authorities as a witness. Day after day they attempted to learn what she knew about plots, by threats, bribes and various promises, but she told them nothing. Finally Colonel Katanski, who is a very strewd officer, succeeded, by means of scraps of evidence obtained here and there, by opening letters and various other methods practiced by the Russian se-cret service, in piecing together a story. It was not accurate but in many respects it came near the truth. This he had had com-mitted to writing and forged to it the name of the accused. He called again upon the girl and showed it to her. Said he:
"Your friends, seeing the futility of longer

denying their guilt, have confessed all and thrown themselves on the mercy of the czar. We have no charge against you and if you tell us what you know you will be rele otherwise it will be necessary to remand you to prison.' The girl, deceived by the speciousness of the whole affair, took a night to think it over

and in the morning made a full statement which was taken down and signed by her. Then she was set free. At the trial her testimony was the only evidence used against her friends and they were convicted.

Rather than rest under the imputation of such perfidy she determined to commit a crime which would necessitate her being sent along with them, and at the same time re-venge herself upon Colonei Katanski. She accordingly called upon him with a pistol conceated in her handkerchief and attempted to shoot him but the bullet only grazed ear and she was disarmed. At the time I saw her she was on her way to Siberia under a twenty years' sentence.

"It is of such material," added Mr. Kennan, "that the Russians are made. I remember upon one occasion referring to an acquaintance of mine as a friend. The Russian to whom I was talking said, what do you mean by a friend! When I call a man my friend I mean that I would die for him if necessary.' "
