Plans for a Workhouse for City Prisoners-What will be Done with the Cash Derived from Bonds.

The Real Estate Owners association held a neeting at the rooms in the New York Life building that was attended by a goodly number of the members. President Boggs presided, and in calling

the meeting to order he stated that its object was for the purpose of taking some steps looking to the advancements of the interests of Omaha. 238
The question of sending a delegation to attend the Missouri river convention that

convenes at Kansas City was discussed. The members were unanimously in favor of such a movement and Messrs. George H. Boggs, A. L. Reed and Andrew Rosewater were

elected as delegates.

There was a spirited discussion when President Boggs announced that he was possessed of the information that another har-ness factory and a wholesale dry goods house wanted to locate in the city. The members favored a conference with the proprietors and appointed Messrs. Cathers and Findley

to act and enter into negotiations. National Competitive Drill.

The coming of the national competitive dritt was brought up for discussion. Mr. Cathers said that it would be of as much cathers said that it would be of as much benefit to Omaha as a national convention. It would bring 5,000 soldiers and at least 50,000 spectators to the city. The gathering would continue one week. Prizes would have to be offered and some action he said should be taken at once. After further discussion a committee constitute of the continues of committee consisting of Messrs, St. A. D. Balcombe, Cathers and Reid was appointed to confer with committees from other organi-

to confer with committees from other organi-zations and devise ways and means for creat-ing a fund to purchase the prizes.

Messrs, W. J. Connell, Jeff Bedford and W. S. Poppleten were appointed a committee to devise plans for a workhouse in which city prisoners who may be convicted and sentenced may work out their fines instead of boarding in the jail, as under the present system. A number of gentlemen spoke upon the subject and all were of the opinion that prisoners should be worked. By putting them upon a stone pile or some other place where hard labor would be exacted jail life would no longer be a luxury.

Colonel Scott, John T. Cathers, St. A. D. Balcombe and Paul Horbach were appointed

a committee, with instructions to be at Lin-coln on December 17 in attendance as delegates to the beet sugar convention. They were instructed to use their efforts to secure the location of a beet sugar factory in this Bonds and Public Charities. The discussion of the use to be made of the

money arising from the sale of the city bonds voted at the November election was entered nto, but no action was taken. The matter was deferred until the next meeting.

The subject of a bureau of charities was aken up and discussed. The idea prevailed hat such an organization was necessary. should be under the management of the ladies of Omana who should act in conjunction with the county superintendent of poor. The ladies should divide themselves into committees, with different sections of the city to look after. Their reports should be accepted by the superintendent of the poor and orders

ssued upon their recommendations.

It was stated that an ice manufacturing establishment was desirous of locating in the city. The committee on manufacturing was instructed to look into the matter and report
