the marshal for a week.

John T. Chapman, convicted of perjury released upon his own recognizance failed to appear. The judge declared the recognizance forfeited and ordered the issuance of a capius forthwith.

David Enslow, one of the Bestrice gang of counterfeiters, was given a \$25 fine and re manded to the customy of the marshal for Ozar Petty, another member of the Beat

rice gang, and apparently the leader, was sent to the penitentiary at Sioux Falls for one year to be confined at hard labor. "The hard labor part of the sentence will

be all a farce, "I am sorry to say," remarked the judge, "for they don't work the prisoners at Sioux Fails at all." William Petty, a brother to Oscar, was given a light sentence because he had simply associated with the counterfeiter and had not been found guilty of helping to manufac-ture the "queer." Judge Dundy made him promise to help support his brother's wife and family till Ozar got out of the penitontiary. The latter has a wife and three children with no visible means of support. William Petty visible means of support. William Petty was fined \$25 and remanded to the custody of the marshal for sixty days.

James Carpenter, also a counterfeiter, got

a \$25 fine and one week in the custody of the marshal.
Rouben Booth, convicted of passing counterfeitmoney, was fined \$23 and got a week in the custody of the marshal.

E. B. Haze was a happy hearted looking colored man found guilty of giving a bottle of whisky to the Indians at Chadron. Haze used to be a member of the Ninth United States cavairy.
