Weak Feeling in Wheat Gave Place to One of Strength.

ADVANCE DUE TO BULL SENTIMENT.

New York Houses Were Ordering Sales in Chicago Against Purchases on the Local Board-This Had a Discouraging Effect.

CHICAGO, ILL. Jan. 13.-The feeling of weaksess which prevailed in the wheat market on and Tuesday gave place of strength today, and the loss of le recorded yesterday was entirely recovered. The carry strength was largely due to the local buil sentiment, the eaders here having apparently come to the conclusion that it was time for a reaction Public cables quoted prices lower, but private bnes said that the feeling in the markets abroad was better and more hopeful. Pardridge and Gifford, bowever, were selling here. and some New York houses were ordering sales in this market against purchases in their own, and these influences prevented any marked advance in prices for some time. though there was a gratual appreciation in values.

The receipts in the northwest were light, and there were liberal buying orders from that section, presumably because the extreme go d weather there suggests to them the likelihood to manage winter wheat. But the most bull sh factor came later in the day in the
