THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

After a Number of Sharp Fluctuations Wheat Closed Unchanged.

CROP DAMAGE REPORTS WERE PLENTIFUL

Trade Was Rather Dull and as a Rule Largely Confined to Professionals, the General Public Still Holding Off.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 4 .- Wheat opened firm and higher this morning, but weakened after a time and after a number of rather sharp fluctuations closed without change compared with yesterday. The foreign news was very generally bullish, strong cables were received both from English and continental markets and higher quotations were made. This in the face of the weak closing here was regarded as quite encouraging and stimulated the buying. Crop damage reports from France were again plentiful and the news of the character received yester-day seemed to be confirmed. McIntyre from New York said that there was good buying there. This fact contributed not a little to the confident feeling which prevailed. 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
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
