PARDRIDGE C'UGHT FOR MILLIONS

His Efforts to Cover Made Matters Worse and the Bold Trader Was Compelled to Face the Music-How it Was Accomplished.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 8.—The Jay Gould of the wheat market at bay, a thousand wildly ex-cited brokers almost literally clutching at his throat and pocket-that was the spectacle here today. In the struggle the price of wheat was forced up 3%c a bu. The frenzy continued long after regular hours and the final cure quotation recorded an additional advance of nearly 2c. Edward Pardridge, the queer looking little individual who succeeded "Old Hutch" as the most daring grain speculator in Chicago, if not in the world, was the man around whom the crowd raved. Pardridge's operations of late have been on an enormous scale and while wheat has been nearly a quarter of a dollar lower for every bushel than at the corresponding time last year, he has been a short seller with a persistence which was never paralleled. During the decline to sic on one of his mammoth deals, he was reputed to have won from his numerous opponents in the market consider-

ably over \$1,000,003, In a spirit of characteristic bravado, he at that time inserted an advertisement in the daily papers offering to buy that amount of Chicago real estate in small pieces. Next day he was reported as having said in an inter-view that the goal he was aiming at was the establishment of a 75c price for wheat. From 80c Pardridge, with gigantic sales and aided by what seemed a remarkable chain of circumstances in his favor throughout the
United States, and no less in Europe, forced
the price about half way to 75c. Before the
coveted goal was reached, the tide turned.
There are shiewed suspicions that things were
not what they seemed and that a few of the
stronger speculators, with their allies in
other American cities and abroad, were quicity shaping matters for Pardridge's destruction in retaliation for huge losses inflicted on
them, John Cudaby, the foreser partner of P.
D. Amour, is reported as the leader in this
extraordinary anti-Pardridge emmaign.
William Lynn is also said to be prominent
with Cudahy.

NEW YORK, April 8.—The stock market to-day fluctuated down materially from its late activity and while liquidation for both sides of the account were still continued it was but the final settling up and business at the exchange was visibly affected by this state of affairs.
