Rev. J. L. Hurlbut of New York Preaches OFFICE: - NO. 12 PEARL STREET. an Elequent Sermon.

RESIGNATION OF A POPULAR PASTOR

Rev. J. M. Crofts Will Sever His Connection with the Congregational Church -Grand Army Matters-Preparing for the Coming of the Democrats.

Rev. J. L. Hurlbut, D.D., of New York City, superintendent of the Chantauqua normal Sunday school work and superintendent of the Sunday school department of the Methodist Episcopal church in this country, occupied the pulpit yesterday mornng at the First Presbyterian church. He ok as his subject the epistle of Paul to the illiopians, and as his text the first verse of the epistic: "Paul and Timotheus, the Servants of Jesus Christ, to all the Saints in Christ Jesus which are at Philippi, with the Bishops and Deacons." He referred to the two ways of studying nature, by examining a grain of sard or by taking in a moun-tein and land-cape at a single glance, a leaf of a tree or the varied beauties of a forest, and drew a parallel between these two ways of studying nature and the two ways of studying the bible-investigating a ingle sentence, clause or word, or standing in an eminence and overlooking a whole ook at once. The latter was the method be adouted in his sermon.
"Paul has been spending many weary days

and nights in prison," said he, "when he sud-denly hears the footfall of a friend, his face brightens, and as the door opens he gazes into the face of Epaphroditus, who comes bring-ing him the greetings of the church at Philappi and along with them the things which be thinks will minister to his temporal happiness. In return he sends back the epistle we are now studying. It has not the soar ing cagle flight of the enistle to the Ephesians, but it has peculiar traits of its own. You have doubtless listened to an oraterio and heard a lofty strain now deep down in the bass, almost concealed by the upper parts, now pearing high above all, but carrying itself through the entire piece. So throughout the epistle to the Philip-pians there is one prevailing characteristic joy. 'Rejoice' is the word about which the whole epistle grows.

"This fact is the more noticeable when we consider that when Paul wrote it he was not in the prime of success, but his life was drawing to a close with failure apparently stamped all over it. Every day a brutal Roman soldier-and the Roman soldiers were picked from the lowest and basest of men-came into his cell and they were bound wrist to wrist and ankle to ankle. When Faul penned the epistle the soldier was at his side. It has seemed to me that if I were in such surroundings ink would not be bitter enough to tell the story of my wees. But the soldiers brought into contact with Paul in this way every lay took away the story of the gospel with them and multitudes heard it through this very experience of Paul's. His happiness was not the result of circumstances, when one has a spring of water con-stantly at his hand what cares he for the drouth; With his enemies outside the prison howing for his death, with the gal-lows looming up in the distance, he had abundant resources in Christ Jesus and knew that his poverty would be rewarded ten thousand times over in the wealth in the

next world. "Love is another striking characteristic of the epistic. We point to Paul as the mightiest apostle of all, and why! Because of the intensity of his conviction, the clear-ness of his views in theology, but most of all, because of his ocep and tender affection, Re loved men and therefore drew men to him. All through life he seems to have

taken hold of some one who followed him to the end of his days. If any one loves men as men he can go anywhere and be happy and this is the principle that was responsible for Paul's success. He was not always so: once he hated men, saw them slain, gleated over their sufferings. What wrought the changes 'The love of Christ constraineth us,' says Paul. The love of Christ was born in him, and from it the love for all his fellow men throbbed in Paul's heart.

"Epuphrodius had brought word of sins that were springing up in the church at Phillippi, of wrong opinions that might turn hornesies luter on at strife and among some of the members. There was canger from selfish ambition. He did not seek to stop these troubles by coming out in strong and bold denunciations; he only set up the glorious character of an ideal Chrisup the glorious character of an ideal Christian so clearly that each one must have longed to be just such a Christian. He goes through the whole list of their defects, but does not tell them of a single one. He simply points out the better path and says, 'et this be your ideal.' The way to make people turn from wrong is to fill their hearts with right and then evil will flee away. Oh, that in a might be benealt the contribute. that in us might be born all the mobility of the Christian religion that is shown forth in the tender epistle of Paul to the Phillippian church."

Rev. G. W. Crofts Resigns. At the morning service of the Congregaional church yesterday the pastor, Rev. G.

W. Crofts, astounded his congregation and the many outsiders who were present by reading from the pulpit this brief but un-equivocal announcement:

With malice toward none and charity for il, after prayerful consideration and with clear sense of duty I hereby tender my respectation as paster of this church, to take fleet three months from date.

The random of the approximation of the sense. The reading of the announcement was con

cluded before the congregation apparently realized its import, and then consternation followed surprise. The relations of the pastor and his congregation have been of that close and fraternal character that can only be realized where love is united with veneration and respect, and where perfect harmony pre-vails. The motive that has prompted the resignation has not been made public, but it cannot be other than one that reflects the bighest credit upon the popular pastor. Whatever it may be the entire public of Council Biuffs will join the members of the church in urging him to reconsider it, for there never has been a pastor in the city who has been more generally loved than the elo-quent poet-preacher, whose tougue and pen-have swept every chord in the gamut of hu-man joy and sorrow that the people of Coun-cil Bluffs have felt since he came here seven years ago. All will feel that neither the church nor the city can afford to lose him, and only imperative reasons will be accepted in justification of his determination to conclude his work here. His ministry here has been one of tipolosy marroy and has reached. tireless energy and has reached every por-tion and every class in the city. No matter whence came the call he has never hesitated wholes cannot the start of the sever hesitated to respond, and while ministering and assuaging the sorrows of people, many of whom were obscure and humble, he has breathed forth poetic germs that have perminnently enriched the literature of the age.

No action can be taken upon the resigna-tion until there is a vestry meeting, and none has yet been called. The fixing of the date upon which the resignation is to take effects in accordance with an agreement between the officers of the courch and the pasto when he was engaged, that three months should clapse between the tender of his resignation and his final withdrawal from the church. It is very likely that the popular preacher will be induced to consent to remain here long before the three months




