

## THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

Corn Was Largely the Feature of Yesterday's Trading.

## AFTER ADVANCING IT FLUCTUATED

Trade was very heavy for an hour and was not positively quiet at any time—stocks and bonds.

CHICAGO, Ill., May 18.—Corn was the leader today. Traders at the opening were greatly wrought up on the weather, and many made an important advance of nine cents a bushel over yesterday's price. July was wanted at the same time at the, against from 41¢ to 43¢ at the close yesterday. The May shorts were soon satisfied from the fact that there were not many of them, and the subsequent fluctuations in the price for the month was of a most erratic character. After it had worked off gradually from 55¢ to 53¢, it was offered again to 54¢ without being bought, and then up to 55¢, and the seller came in forward, July, at 54¢ more, coms steady firm than this month, and in the former was concentrated the bulk of the day's business. The trade was very heavy for an hour and was not positively quiet at any time. Kempton-Hopkins were among the buyers for May, and among the sellers, H. H. Frazee, C. C. & Co., and H. H. Frazee, L. L. & Co. and Boyden & Co. The most prominent sellers were the Weller Commission company, Farman, C. & Co., and Coster & Martin. July opened at 41¢, sold as high as 43¢, back to 42¢ and closed at that, against from 43¢ to 44¢.

With May corn touching 5¢ wonder is expressed that such a steady trader as Crandall sold his long of May a few weeks ago at 50¢, and now wanted a line round 46¢. Partridge, who is short a big line for July, estimated as high as 56¢, or even 57¢, and he is right. In fact, when last future got to 43¢ and 44¢, he continued to sell through Baldwin almost equally the crop wanted.
