Decoration day was observed in Council Bluffs yesterday with all the pomp and ceremony that usually accompanies this holiday. Early in the day the ladies of the Grand Army post met at the Merriam block for the purpose of making the wreaths and bouquets that were to be used in decorating the graves of the fallen heroes.

The first feature of the celebration, and

the one in which the people of the city were most interested, was the parade. Bayliss park was crowded and all the streets in the vicinity from which a view of the forming of the procession could be obtained were linea with men, women and children, all of them cager to witness the passing of the parade. The crowds kent coming for ully an hour and a half before 2:30 o'clock, the time at which the procession started on its way under the leadership of L. B. Cousins, marshal of the day, and his assistants.

The procession started at the corner of Pearl street and Willow avenue and moved northward on Pearl to Broadway, where it turned onto Main street, going to Fairview cometery by way of Washington and Oak-land avenues. Most of the business and dwelling houses along the line of march were gaily decorated with flags and streamers. gaity decorated with flags and streamers.

The parade was headed by a platoon of police, behind which came Dalbey's band, dis-

lice, behind which came Daibey's band, discoursing martial music along the way. Then followed the members of Dodge camp No. 259 Sons of Veterans, Postmaster Treynor with his corps of mail carriers, a full representation from Abe Lincoin post Grand Army of the Republic, the Woman's Relief corps, Encampment No. 8, Union Veteran legion, and the Ladies auxiliary No. 17. Three wagons filled with children from the Christian home were followed by the Danebo society. One of the most interesting features of the parade was the Washington avenue drum corps, composed of a dozen avenue drum corps, composed of a dozen boys a dozen years old or thereabout, in full red, white and blue uniforms, who furnished music that set the feet of the heary-headed veteracs dancing.
