Rev. G. W. Crofts Determined to Leave His Present Location.

HIS CONGREGATION SERIOUSLY OBJECTS

Decision of the Popular Minister Finally Announced at Yesterday's Services-Caught a Covington Gambler for an Old Offense.

ANOTHER ATLANTIC CABLE. The New Line Between Africa and South America.

The cable that is to be laid between Senegal and Pernambuco has been shipped from England and is now on its way to the African coast in the British teamship Silvertown, says the New York Sun. It was constructed by the Telegraph Works company of London, and a number of recent inventions have been used in its construction. There have been many improvements in cable making since the first Atlantic line was laid, thirty-four years ago, by Cyrus W Field and his associates. The cable to run between Senegal in Africa and Pernambuco in Brazil was taken aboard coiled up in three tanks and ready for paying out at the bow end of the vessel. not at the stern, as was formerly custom. The cable is of varying thicknesses, ranging from two and one-quar ter tons per knot to four and one-hall tons, according to the depth of the water in which it is to be 'aid, while the shore ends weigh about fifteen tons per knot At Senegal the shore end is to be cov ered by a hut and left in charge of an electrical engineer, who will be in communication day and night with the cabi bearing ship. Signals will be ex-changed every five minutes during the whole operation of laying the cable to Brazil. In the deep sea the cable wil be paid out at the rapid rate of ten knot an hour, though large allowance mus be made for stoppages through im-pediments 1,000 fathoms deep. Accord ing to the engineer in charge the line will be laid and the Silvertown back in England before the end of the month Aboard the steamer there is a large staff of engineers and assistants, who work in four-hour shifts and then have eight hours off. The Life of a "Limited."

In answer to the question what is the average "life" of a New York and Chicago limited train, a Pennsylvania railroad official says, according to the Philadelphia Record, that it is a trifle over six months, and the fact that such a train goes to the shops to be thoroughly overhauled and refitted twice a year will show how careful the great railroads are to keep up their standard. Very often the trains show but little wear, and only here and there can the result of six months' use be de tected, but they are nevertheless ordered to the shops, stripped of their interior fittings, repainted, gone over by the workmen of every department that took a hand in originally constructing them, and then restored to the cabinetmakers and upholsterers to be turned out again practically new cars. Another interesting point was that these trains are not "patched up" with a new car now and another new car again, but are always sent out in complete sets of cars from the shops, and when this is done the train which is taken off to give place to the new one is used for some less distinguished run

A chimney 350 feet high is being built for the Omaha & Grant Smelting works in Denver, Cole. 
