## THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

Grain on the Board of Trade Yesterday Was Easier.

NOT MUCH ACTIVITY IN THE CORN CROWD

Many of the Big Longs Had Previously Sold Out and the Market Lacked Snap-Oats Were Fairly Active.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 16.- The grain markets on the Board of Trade were easier today. The fluctuations were confined to a narrow range and closed near the lowest figures. Provisions, on the other hand, were fairly active and stronger, and after fluctuating within a very moderate range, closed at about the top. The news of the day in grains was not particularly significant, but most of it was bearish and sufficed to make all of the leading cereals heavy. In the wheat pit weaker cables caused the market to open a point lower. This was supplemented by cables showing an increase of 2,000,000 bu, in the English visible supply and a more favorable showing as to the Russian crop. Then New York and St. Louis were free crop. STOCKS AND BONDS, Transactions in Silver Attracted More Attention Than Usual.

New York, Aug. 16.—The rise in silver which would seem to indicate that the late decline really had its origin in speculative transactions and the treasury paying gold for silver notes, went a long way toward encouraging buying of securities in the stock market today but there was no new business in sight and the demand of shorts, though light, was sufficient to advance prices all along the life, the offerings being unusually light in view of the facts mentioned. The return of confidence. however, was most marked and the strength developed in the market in time wore away and brought with it an increase in the amount of business which was regarded as a healthy sign, though few now predict either a broader or more active market until after September or more active market until after September 1. One of the features of the day was the rise of Western Union, which was predicted some time ago, but the deal-in-s presented few points of interest and the novements among railroad sharest were confined to the narrowest limits, except in the grangers, in which the covering of shorts, as usual of late, was most conspicuous. The industrials continued to absorb the greater part of the strength of the market, and the cordace stocks and general electric were both conspicuous for the advances made, while southern cotton oil lost a portion of its late improvement.

White to the street may have been the strength in Manhattan.
