Republican Cancuses Will Be Held Today

to Arrange for Delegates.

Several Aspirants Have Sent in Their Namer to Be Placed Upon the Official Primary Battot-Who and What They Are.

This evening caucuses will be held by by the republicans in the various wards and precincts to prepare tickets to be voted on at the primaries, which will be held just one week later. legislative ticket.
At these same primaries, to be held one week from today the various wards will name their respective candidates for the city council and a delegation to the city conven-tion, which will be held Monday, September tion, which will be held Monday, September 19, to name five candidates for members of the Board of Education. It must be remembered that no caucuses will be held in the matter of determining who are to be councilmanic candidates or delegates to the city convention, but that all aspirants must file their petitions, signed by twenty voters of the ward, with the secretary of the city central committee at republican head-quarters, on or before Monday, September 12, at 12 o'clock noon, in order to have their names placed on the primary tickets, the names of councilmanic candidates to be printed in the order of their filing, and those printed in the order of their filing, and those of the delegates in alphabetical order.
