Chicago Live Stock Market.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 17.—[Special Telegram to The Bee.]—Good native cattle sold as well as on the closing days of last week. There were not many of them and they were all wanted; for the poorer grades the market also displayed reasonable activity, but it was weak as a consequence of a too liberal supply. The arrivals included about 12,00 natives and 10.000 range cattle. The former were quoted at from \$1.40 to \$1.71. Cows and bulls selling on a basis of from \$1.01 to \$1.01. for inferior to extra qualities, and from \$2.15 to \$3.20 being the range for common to extra steers. Texas cattle were saiable at from \$1.25 to \$3.00 and westerns at from \$1.50 to \$4.50. Not much stock was left unsold, and the general market had a stoady look at the cose. Feeding cattle were in active demand and sold stronger.

Higher proces were paid for hogs. The advance varied from 5c to 15c with an average gain of about 10c. Receipts fell a long way short of the number looked for and to that fact alone was due the upturn in prices. Half of the supply was required to fill shipping orders, and the remainder not being sufficient to meet the wants of local packers, there was a guick market. The best assorted high weights sold up to from \$5.60 to \$5.65, and fancy, heavy and medium weights were pushed to \$4.75, but there was not much trading at those figures, from \$3.35 to \$5.65 taking the greater number. The close was firm at from \$4.00 to \$5.65 for light and at from \$5.00 to \$5.55 for medium and heavy.
