Will Be Returned to New York.

An officer from Rochester, N. Y., arrived in the city yesterday and identified J. Crawford, who is in the county jail, as one of the seven men who sawed their way out of the Rochester jail on the night of September 24. Crawford had been jailed in the first place for breaking into a church and stealing a lot of plate. On conviction he was sent to the reform school, but as soon as he was released he had rallied the officers and was awaiting trial on the second charge when he contrived to escape. ALL ARE ANXIOUS TO BE POSTMASTER

Applicants for the Position and Their Units—An Appointment Demanded as Soon as Possible—Four of the Most Prominent Aspirants.

Ever since last Wednesday morning at 1 o'clock the democrats of Council Bluffs have been busily engaged in trying to name the successor to Postmaster J. M. Tresner. This office, with its salary of \$800 a year, and the prestige it gives the holder, is one very much sought after by the politicians and there is likely to be some great wire-pulling between now and next fall, when Tresner's term expires. So far four aspirants have been heard from with a promise of others turning up from time to time. The congressional election is the chief factor in this, as the election of a democrat will give the inside track, from the fact that he will hold the position under Cleveland's first administration. Judge J. E. F. Minton, however, is mentioned frequently from his having made the race for congressional nomination, and it is expected that he will be nominated for the position.
