

## THE SPECULATIVE MARKETS

Wheat Was on the Jump Yesterday and Prices Improved.

### CORN LEFT OFF WITH QUITE A LOSS

Considerable Alarm Among Short Was Manifested at the Opening in Wheat and There Was a General Rush to Cover.

**CHICAGO, ILL., Nov. 11.—Wheat was on the jump today. The government crop report was the cause and prices were lifted 15¢, closing within 10¢ of the top. The figures on corn muddled the market and that cereal left off with a loss of 10¢. Oats was unchanged and provisions a shade easier.**

A good deal of alarm among shorts was a general rush to cover and the market for a time was quite excited. Candles were weak and lower, but this had little or no influence here, nor did the fact that Partridge, Logan and others sold generously on the advance. After the noon hour the market had another spurt, but the rallied sales sent it back somewhat. It is something unusual to see so many short sellers report on the wheat market in November and October. Last month's percentages indicated a crop of 500,000,000 bu., based on the percentages of acreage published in June and this average yield per acre published in October confirmed the estimated acreage and the yield will be even greater now, and this which created the strength and an advance in the market. It was a desired surprise.

The oneiner was about from 5¢ to 10¢ higher than yesterday; closing 2½¢ in firm and prices were advanced from 3¢ to 4¢ more, then became unchained and prices declined for December and 10¢ for May, again do-  
ing 2½¢. No. 2 mixed, 27½¢; No. 2 white, 20¢.
