Why the Will of the Late Edward Cagney Will Be Contested.

HIS MONEY WAS LEFT TO THE CHURCH

Relatives of the Deceased Declare That He Was Mentally Incapable of Disposing of His Property-Other News from Lincoln.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 11 .- Special to Tue BEE. |-The Cagney will contest case was begun before County Judge Lansing this forenoon and it gives promise of being one of considerable interest. Edward P. Cagney. whose last will and testament is disputed, died in this city something over a year ago, leaving an estate valued at about \$20,000. At first it was supposed that he left no provisions for the disposal of his property, but six months ago the will was found in an old secretary at the residence of Hon. John Fluggerald, at which Mr. Cagney lived and died. The will bequeathed the entire estate to Mrs. John Fitzgerald, with the provision that in case there was a contest onehalf of the property would revert to l'ather Fitzgerald for use in his ecclesiastical work, while the remainder should go for educational work in the Cataolic church. The will is contested by the mother, brothers and sister of the deceased on the ground that Cagney was of unsound mind when he made the will and that he had also been un-duly influenced in drawing it up the way he

From Lincoln Court Rooms,

Mary Brown came into district court this forenoon with a petition usging that Fisher & Westover be restrained from seiling her personal property on a chattel mortgage given by her husband. She alleges that she never signed the mortgage and claims her

exemption rights.

The contest over the possession and control of the minor children of William and Mary Berger, referred to in these columns last week, has finally reached the district court. Berger came into court with a peti-tion in which he alleges that he was granted a divorce from his wife in 1889 and that he was given the custody of the little boy, while the court placed the little girl under the control of her mother. He asserts that a year ago he made an agreement with his divorced wife, who is now Mrs. Preese, by which the children were to be educated together, but that in last April Mrs. Preese had both children visit her and since that time she refuses to give them up. He tells the court that they are growing up in vice and mendicancy and asks for an order restoring them to his custody.

More Hiegal Voting.

In addition to the three men arrested for illegal voting Wednesday night, two more bave been placed under arrest and will probably have their preliminary examination to-morrow. Last night Chief of Police Otto and Officer Morrissey placed under arrest Lee Foster and Richard Wilson. The two men have been employed as graders on the Rock Island railroad in this city. They veted in precinct A of the First ward and Chief Otto, who made the complaint, says he has indisputable evidence that both came to this city from Denver less than five weeks ago and that they voted by certificates signed by prominent ward politicians of this c'ty. He also states that one of the certificates was signed by a reputition and the other by a democrat. Wilson acknowledged to the chief that he was paid \$1 for his vote, while Foster en assert that they were drunk when they cast their ballots.

court this morning for an assault upon H. B. Sawyer on the early morning of November 1. No Sunday Ball Playing.

Sometime during the base ball season of 1891 a number of the players in the Lincoln Western league team were arrested for playing ball on Sunday. The case was carried to the district court and the men arrested were found guilty of violating the Sunday laws of the state and were fined accordingly. They carried their case to the supreme court and yesterday afternoon that body decided that base ball playing on Sunday was a clear violation of the laws of the state. The syllibus of the opinion is as follows:
"Under the provisions of section 241 of the criminal code any person of 14 years of age or upwards who shall on Sunday engage in

or upwards who shall on Sunday engage in sporting, etc., shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$20 or be confined in the county fail not exceeding twenty days, or both.

An Indian Trader Tells His Manuf cturers Association Planning to Have Story of Kickapoo Indian a Permanent Exposition.

The executive committee of the Manufacturers and Consumers association met yesterday afternoon in the association's rooms in Tun Ban building. The following were elected members of the association: Arlington Mill company, Ariington, millers; The Heya Photo Supply company, Omaha, pieture frames; National Oil and Paint company, Omahe.

The regular bills were read and ordered paid as soon as approved by the finance com-

The Apollo club submitted a proposition to give a concert for the friends of the manufacturers. The scheme was to arrange an entertainment something on the order of the one given last winter. The subject was thoroughly discussed and it was decided not to accept the proposition as the association would not be justified in going to so great an

President Page stated that they had been looking up the exposition building question during the past week. He had secured an estimate on a brick building 350x18) feet, walls tweaty-five feet high with a quarter pitch roof. Such a building was estimated by the architect to cost \$22,000 to \$25,000. Secretary Holmes stated that he had consulted another architect who had made the same estimate of the cost.
Parties owning land centrally located had

been seen and there was no doubt about the possibility of seening a good site at a reasonable annual rental. The plan proposed is to organize a building company independent of the manufacturers association. It would be a stock company and the building would be used for expositions, conventions, concerts and for whatever purposes a large hall might be required. The president stated that if such a building was put up in a contral location it

would be a paying investment.

"We could hold an exposition there next spring for twenty days," continued the speaker, "that would clear up \$1,030 per day. We ran our exposition last spring in the Collseum building under great disad-vantages and yet we took in \$500 a day, and know that we could easily double that

with a good building in a good location."
Messrs, Page and Holmes were appointed a committee to secure written propositions from parties who had suitable ground which they might be willing to tease for an exposi-

Several prominent business men outside of the association were quoted as being greatly in favor of having an exposition building and as ready to take stock in such an enterprise. The point was made that the erection of such a building for the purpose of displaying goods of Nebraska manufacture would be a great advertisement for the Nebraska manufacturers and would do more to promulgate the home patronage movement

promulgate the home patronage movement than anything else could do.

It was agreed by all present that if an exposition was to be held in Omaha next spring something should be done toward providing a building at once, as the old Collseum building was too small, besides being located in an inaccessible part of the city. The prepased building was too should be to the control of the city. The proposed building would be fifty feet longer and ten feet wider than the Col-iseum building, besides being arranged on a plan that would allow of the space being tilized to a much greater advantage. The secretary outlined several schemes for increasing the consumption of Nebraska manufactured goods, which were approved by the committee and ordered carried out.

Beet Sugar Factories.

M. A. Lunn, editor of the Bost Sugar Enterprise, was in the city yesterday. He says that the United States Beet Sugar company of building some beet sugar factories for the season of 1893, and is looking out for favorable sites on which to build. Mr. Lunn also says that if the company can get a guarantee that 5,000 acres would be planted in sugar beets within a radius of twenty-five miles of the location of the fac-tory the company would be willing to erect a factory with a capacity for handling 500 tons of beets per day, which means turning out about lifty tons of sugar per day.

Mr. Lunn is of the opinion that such a fac-tory in the vicinity of Omaha or Douglas county could be made a grand success, and he is willing to meet a number of business men and point out the advantages that would be derived from the establishment of such a concern. All he wants is an opportu-nity to address those interested or those who may become interested, and if the Board of Trade will take the matter up and get up a meeting he will gladly attend and give some valuable information in regard to sugar beet ulture, providing he is given proper notice. He has awakened a lively interest in the subject in the east, where he has been lec-
