RAPID TRANSIT REVOLUTION. Electricity Pushing into the Domain of Steam Power.

St. Paul Ploneer Press: We are somewhat prepared, from our knowledge of the changes produced by the substitution of the steam railroad for the stage coach, to understand what will happen in case the projected electric railroad between Chicago and St. Louis, which is to carry passengers at the rate of 100 miles and upward an hour, should prove a success. Its revolutionary elfects will not be by any means confined to the transportation of people from point to point, but it will bear upon and alter hundreds of the commonest facts of our daily life, and revolutionize to a considerable extent the course of business. Mr. Edward Atkinson has laid stress upon the fact that every great invention or improvement in machinery is potent as a destroyer, and that practically all the implements used in doing the world's work must be consigned to the junk shop every twenty years. One has but to think back for a moment and imagine himself purchasing for use today the pattern of any kind of machine that was on the market twenty years ago to appreciate the truth of it. And very far-reaching and revolutionary will be the work of the new rapid transit scheme if its practical operation meets the hopes of its projectors.

The first great effect, of course, will be the flat issued against the existing railroads of the country. They will not be destroyed immediately or lie as unused property any more than people have ceased to make or use needles since the sewing machine was invented. But they will be assigned to new uses. The great trunk lines between important cities, with all the improvements that have been made to secure comfort and rapid travel, must be used thereafter mostly for freight carriage. If it is possi-ble to carry people with comfort and safety at the rate of 100 miles per hour of average speed, with a promise of better time still in the future, then it is clear that the passenger train of the present, with all its costly accessories, and not-withstanding the untold millions that have been expended upon its development and improvement, must disappear as surely as the clipper ship before the ocean greyhound. If people can travel from New York to Chicago in from six to eight hours, they will not spend twenty-five on the way. And if the thing is a mechanical possibility, then the money to make it a reality will be forthcoming upon demonstration. If the St. Louis-Chicago electric is a success, lines built and operated in the same way will connect all the larger cities of the country before the end of five years.

There can be no steep grades or heavy curves in a roadbed carrying vehicles that move at the rate of 100 miles an hour. There can be no crossings at grade. Over the heads or under the feet of the people, or in lanes securely walled against all approach, will speed the motor of the future. Except for the longest journeys, half-way or more across a continent, the sleeping car will pass out of use. The railroads now in operation would be used, for a time, as carriers of freight, and those which serve a rural patrounge would hold their place for many years. But eventually freights would seek the rapid transit lines, just as most of them have forsaken the steamboat for

A Cruel Practical Joke Played on an Ohio

Judge. Judge Walker Reid was a famous lawyer and judge of ante-beilum times, says the Cincinnati Commercial Gazette. He was for many years a circuit judge before the county seat of Mason was transferred from Washington to Maysville. He was physically a man of great size, especially about the girth. Morally he was a gem without a flaw, and mentally he hardly had a superior in the commonwealth. He was a man of great digolty of character, and, to a stranger, bore the air of being unapproachable. But he had a heart as simple as a child's, and those who approached him found his seeming austerity melted at once into kindness and gentle courtesy. He was of rather quick temper, but his anger was of that volatile kind that ejects Itself in rapid spurts, leaving his mind rosy with good

nature. Ex-Congressman Wadsworth of Maysville, at present one of the attorneys of the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad, was one of Judge Reid's most active tor-

mentors, as well as his greatest favorite. The worst joke ever played on the old judge was in 1845. The judge and a lot of his lawyer chums were on their way from the Lewis circuit court to Flemingsburg. Of course, Wadsworth was dong, and ready for duty as usual. their way it was necessary to cross Kinniconick creek. "THE PRINCE OF SAFEM IN."

Bold Expiolts of an American Criminal Arrested in Belgium, Adam Worth, anas man, who has been arrested at Llege, in who has been arrested by the New Adam Worth, alias Harry Raymond, Belgium, is considered by the New York police to be the most noted of American criminals abroad. He has for years made London his residence, being a fugitive from justice from the United States for complicity in the ex-

tensive Boylston bank robbery, at Boston, about twenty years ago.
Worth, who is now about 50 years of ago, has long been considered the "prince of safemen." Among the earlier exploits of this daring criminal was the plundering of the Ocean bank in 1869, when he was associated with Charley W. Bullard, alias 'Piano Charley,' and Isaac Marsh, alias 'Big Ike." Maximilian, or Mark Shinbaen, and

'Bob" Cockran were also members of the gang.
Among other big robberies which
Worth's gang succeeded in was that of
the Morchants Union Express company, on the New York Central railroad between New York city and Buffalo. Bullard, Marsh and a reformed ex-convict bound and gagged the messenger while the other members of the gang covered the train hands with pistols. They got away with about \$100,000. Marsh and Bullard were captured in Canada and brought back to White Plains jail, but pending their trial some of their con-

they went to Boston. they went to Boston.

It was only a few months later that the Boyiston bank robbery took place. The burglars got away with cash and securities amounting to \$450,000. With this rich haul the trio hastened to Europe. In Paris the "American Bar," a cafe in the Rue Scribe, was opened by Bullard under the name of Charles H. Wells, and it was there that a thriving gambling business was conducted until recently, when the French authorities closed the place, Bullard being sentenced to one year in prison.

After the Edylston bank robbery Worth remained abroad a long time, although he has made a number of trips to Canada. Worth was arrested in New York city some years ago for blowing open the safe in Stiner's tea store, in Vosey street, but he got off, the evidence against him being too flimsy. Worth is believed to be very rich, owning his own house in London, where he lives in grand style. He is the owner, also, of a fine steam yacht, and every season enter-tains his friends—all of a shady charac-ter—cruising up and down the Mediter-

It was only a few weeks ago that Su-perintendent Byrnes received a request from the authorities on the other side for a description of Worth, which it was found tallied with that of a crock who has been victimizing some of the wealthiest banks on the continent. The wealthiest banks on the continent. The indictment against him for the Boylston bank robbery in Boston is still alive, and it will be difficult for him to get away from his victims abroad by coming to this country, as his picture is in every rogues' gallery, and the police of every city will be on the lookout for him.
