

THE CONDITION OF TRADE

Movement of Goods in a Jobbing Way
Satisfactory.

COLLECTIONS WITHOUT EXCEPTION GOOD

In Some Lines There is a Little Complaint
of a Falling off in the Volume of Busi-
ness Since the Election—The
Bank Clearings.

The jobbing trade of Omaha can still truthfully be reported as very good, and complaints from those most interested are few and far between. It seems the season has arrived when a let up in the movement of goods is anticipated. A jobber remarked that an easing up in the demand was almost welcome this year after such a rush as has been experienced during the past few months, and that their men were actually worn out and in need of a little rest. In such lines as groceries, which are in demand all the year through, the trade is in a most satisfactory condition, and the volume of goods moving is large. Every business man that makes a tour of the state returns convinced that the conditions were never better than at the present time, and that trade is bound to continue good the balance of the winter, or until the new crop begins to attract attention.

Collections are averaging very good and it would be safe to say that they were never better than at the present time. Money is apparently easy in the country and the retail dealers are selling more goods than usual for cash. Local collections are also fair.

In some directions a little complaint is heard of a tendency toward the conservative in business, owing, apparently, to apprehension as to future legislation.

Bank Clearings.

The basic figures of Omaha continue to indicate a very prosperous condition of business. The clearings for the past week show a gain of 25 per cent over the same week last year, which is very gratifying when it is taken into consideration that business is not in its prime.

The total clearing for the month just closed was \$5,757,156. This on its face, shows a falling off of \$2,002,317, as compared with the month of October.
