A trace was found of her here, but after a three days' search the ex-justice is inclined to believe she has left the city.

Brendle made considerable money after leaving Whitehall, Ill., where he and his wife formerly lived. There is but one claimant for the estate, an aunt of the dead man.

Mr. Sullivan then got on the train and rode to Hastings before making the arrest. At Hastings he went forward to the mail car and when Leightey saw him walking along the platform he suddenly sprang back from the door of the mail car. This was a sufficient indication to the inspector that he was on the right track and he hurried into the car and placed. Mr. Leightey under arrest. He placed Mr. Leightey under arrest. He searched him to see if he could find the letter about his person, but he failed to find it. He then told Leightey to bring the Holdrege package and open it. Leightey complied with the request but the letter containing the \$20 addressed to George W. Herron had been extracted.
