



Transforming Idahe's Arid Acres Into Fertile Fields by Means of Irrigation.

A MAMMOTH DITCH SCHEME IS REVIVED

London Gazes on Montana Gems-Another Tin Strike in the Black Hills Blossoms in the Salton Desert-Western News.

The mammoth New York irrigating ditch projected in the vicinity of Boise City, ldaho, will, when completed, be the most extensive single system in the United States. The main ditch will be seventy miles long, with numerous laterals, and will irrigate 300,000 acres of land. Already \$250,000 has been expended upon it, and the total cost is

expected to reach \$1,500,000. The ditch was commenced two years ago, 1,500 men being employed. After a mile or two of the ditch had been excavated Harvey, the English capitalist, who was at the head of the company, was killed in a railroad necident and the affairs of the concern were thrown into chaos. The company has now been re organized and the completion of the ditch is assured. At certain seasons of the year the Boise river will be insufficient to fill it and tremendous storage reservoirs will have to be constructed. Resumption of the work means lively times in Boise and south-

Montana Gems in London.

The Saturday Review of London reports that Mr. Edwin Streeter is now showing in the world's metropolis "a collection of sapphires from the Montana mines. These stones, which have attracted a good deal of attention lately, are to be seen in all their stages, from the rough pebble to the finished jewel, in various sizes and in many beautiful colors-pale straw, blue, green, violet and the red variety, more commonly known as the ruby. The place where they are found is said to be an ancient river bed; are found is said to be an ancient river bed; and not only are stones of considerable size found there, but the entire soil is a fine dust composed of tiny gems, which of course are only fit to be ground up for cutting and polishing purposes. A curious point about the sapphires from this district is that they are all marked on both sides with a clearly defined equilateral triangle. Simply as a curiosity is shown what is said to be the largest black diamond yet discovered. It is not particularly beautiful, resembling a lump of black lead more than anything else, but its hardness is very great. To polish it a year's work has been sacrificed, and in rea year's work has been sacrificed, and in re ducing it from 160% carats in the rough to a brilliant of 66 carats, 150 carats of bort (impure diamond) have been used. A sister stone of 160 carats has also just reached Mr. Streeter.

Rich Tin Strike.

The Harney Peak Tin company has opened the richest tin mine in the world in one of its locations on Tenderfoot gulch. The company has driven a tunnel in 1,100 feet when a ninefoot vein of rich ore was struck 600 feet from the surface. On Friday last a car load of ore from this yein was sent to the mill. The ore on an average assays 40 per cent metallic tin. Robert Flormann, who was at Hill City on Friday last, stated to a reporter of the Sin Miner that he never saw such rich ore in his life and that the question of tin existing in the Black Hills in paying quantities is for-ever settled. Mr. Flormann is of the opinion that with the placing of American tin upon the markets the demand for Black Hills mining property will be great and that monied men once convinced of the fact, the

future of the country is assured. The discovery of, this rich vein of tin ore is the best news the southern Hills has had for many a day and is of such a character and magnitude that it at once sets at rest the question of tin being produced in paying

Mining Depression in Utah.

In an interview in Chicago Mr. S. W. Eccles, assistant general freight agent of the Union Pacific, is quoted as follows regarding the depression in the lead and mining interests of Utah:

"Mines have shut down which have never before failed to pay dividends. This is not caused by lack of ore, for some of the mines which ceased operations have great quanti-ties of mineral in sight. It is due to leg-islation hostile to the welfare of lead and silver producers. A few day ago the great silver mine Outario, which has paid \$15,

000,000 in dividends, shut down. "The whole trouble is due to the depre-ciated prices of silver and lead. And of course legislation brought the prices down.
"We have, I believe, the greatest undeveloped mining region in the world. All we need is capital. At the second session of this congress a powerful effort will be made to have Utah admitted as a state, and if the senate is democratic we expect to be success fui, for Utah is strongly democratic."

Overrun with Wolves.

The region of Wyoming, extending from Sherman to Sybille and from Horse Creek to Laramie, is overrun with big wolves. Mr. George Shanton, a rancher at Sybille, reports that they will run down a mare weighing 1,080 pounds inside of half a mile. Mr. Shanton roped one wolf that would weigh 150 pounds, and there are at least fifteen or twenty of them within a radius of forty miles. They run in bunches of four or five

miles. They run in bunches of four or five and are terrorizing the ranges.

Four large 4-year-old mares have been killed by these brutes near Shanton's ranch and twenty head of 2 and 3-year-old cattle have been destroyed near the head of Pole creek and the Chug. The bounty on wolves is but \$2.50 and on coyotes \$1.25 a head, so that the only way to get rid of the pests is far the cattlement to get out, and hour them for the cattlemen to get out and hunt them

The Salton desert of California was overflowed about a year ago. The water came from the Colorado river. When it disappeared it left a covering of sitt on the previously barren scene, where shifting sands had been the rule as truly as in the great waste been the rule as truly as in the great waste of the Sahara. Searcely had the water departed when this slime became the foundation soil for what soon developed into an immense mass of verdure.
