Washington Post: It will surprise a great many people to hear that a statue of the late Chester A. Arthur is now ready to put in place. The custom in New York, when anything is to be done for the beautification of the city, is to raise a great outery in the "metropol-itan dailies," reminding the country of New York's enormous wealth and unappreachable splendor, and concluding with an appeal to provincial credulity for the means wherewith to beautify. The Arthur monument, however, was in the hands of men who honored that modest and gracious memory too much to drag it through such sordid mire, The money required for the purpose was raised quietly among his friends, without parade or solicitation, and now the completed work is ready. It is thus de-

scribed in the Metropolis: "The statue is nine feet two inches in height, and the plinth six inches. The statue is to be mounted on a pedestal nine feet high. The pedestal is to be of white granite with cak leaves of bronze at the top. The intention is to place the statue in a circular court forty feet in diameter. Around half of the court is to be a granite wall four feet high, with seats cut in the granite. At each end of the wall is to be a statue of **a** woman in Greechan robes. The site for the statue has not yet been selected. It s thought that the committee will ask he park commissioners for permission

place the statue in either Central or Riverside park." The erection of this beautiful me-morial, at whatever point may be hereafter designated by the authorities, will

doubtless recall to thoughtful men the salient features of Mr. Arthur's remarkable career and the singular tolly and ingratitude of the republican party leaders. Coming into the presidency at a time when the republican organiza-tion seemed to be hopelessly dislocated, he succeeded by a wise, patriotic, clean and liberal conduct of otte, clean and internit conduct of affairs in restoring his party to self-respect, to harmony, and to courage. And yet, although at the end of his term, he went before a nominating convention in which thirty-six out of the thirty-eight states there represented had unmistakably endorsed his policy and advocated his nomination, he was re-pudiated by the so-called leaders and set aside for a man who lost the country four months later. He was a brave and honest gentleman, a devoted patriot, a stainless and unselfish magistrate; but the men who handled the machine in 1884 ignored all this, ignored, too, the

manifest desire of the country, and, in setting him aside, consigned their party to disaster. His memory will live when they are

forgotten by respect and gratitude. Millions in the years to come will gaze on his majestic effigy, and tell or be told by their fellow-citizens that Chester A. Arthur was a man of whom his generation, without regard to party sentiment, was reverently proud.
