Suspension of Work in the Tin Mines Creates General Surprise.

NO SATISFACTORY EXPLANATION GIVEN

Bensons Assigned Fall to Agree with Known Facts -- Views and Interviews Serve to Increase the Clouds That Screen the Cause.

Dispatches announcing the suspension of work in the mines and mills of the Harney Peak Tin company, in the Black hills, as sign as the cause the desire of the English owners to supply the American market with the product of the Cornwall mines. The explanation does not explain.

From the moment tin was discovered in the Hills, English capital was interested in it. English agents examined the property. English papers published the reports of experts and discussed the value of the ore, and English capital was employed almost exclusively in its development. The duty on imported tin imposed by the McKinley bill had in view the protection of the Black Hills and Temascal, Cal., tin mines from foreign competition, and the duty was to be permanent in the event of the American product aggregating 12,000,000 pounds by July, 1803. The Temascal mines have petered out, but all accounts agree that the Harney Peak mines contain a larger per cent of tin ore than any known. If the English or Welsh owners desire the abolition of the duty, the suspension of the Black Hills mines would not be necessary, for it is more than probable a tariff reform administration

ould do the work at the proper time. It must be remembered that two or three million dollars have been invested in developing the property. Last fall a large equipped with costly machinery, Was started up on a test run. The investments made since the McKinle passed contradict the assumption that the imposition of a duty had a bearing as to the suspension. Nor is it probable the quality of the ore suddenly deteriorated. Only a few weeks ago it was amounted that a new lead yielded the richest ore yet found. Besides, the company had sufficient profitable ore on the dumps to keep the mill going for three years. It is evident there are other reasons n the tariff or the quality of the ore at the bottom of the suspension.

## Rumors and Speculations.

The action of the company is as surprising as it is inexplicable to the Black Hills people. Speaking of the suspension the Deadwood Times says:
"A week ago yesterday Superintendent J.

S. Childs of the Harney Peak Tin Mining company left Hill City for New York, having been called thither by the chief officers and stockholders of the company. He was, how-ever, met at Chicago by certain membors of the company, at which place a consultation was held and Mr. Childs returned to Hill City, arriving here Wednesday, and very soon after stopped all operation in the mines and mill. The men were all discharged, numbering over one hundred all told, and every sign of activity summarily stopped, even to the prospecting that had been done on some of the claims.

"Superintendent Childs is very reticent concerning the matter and others do not seem to know the true inwardness of affairs. The machinery was made and put in by Frazer & Chalmers, and is the finest plant ever built by the firm. It cost \$150,000 and was paid for in three payments, the last one being made a few days ago, when the mill was accepted by the Harney Peak company. George Labram, who superintended placing the machinery and has had charge of the test run for Frazer & Chalmers, left for Chicago yesterday. Before leaving, how-ever, he instructed masons carefully about the details of a furnace now being built for drying concentrates before shipping. The furnace will be built as fast as possible. It is not an expensive affair, but is being built substantial and evidently intended for large the mill was running satisfactorily and that a large quantity of concentrates had been accumulated, but would not be shipped until they had 100 tons on hand. So far as we are able to learn there has not been a pound of concentrates shipped yet.

There cannot be any doubt that the run of two and one-half months has not paid operating expenses. But it was scarcely expected it would, as there was more or less experimenting about it, as is the case with all new plants. But the management was and probably is, confident of overcoming all obstacles and working to better advantage in the future. Of course there are a thou

and theories advanced for the suspension, but nobody outside the management is cognisant of the facts, and it is impossible to ob-tain the truth. Many are of the opinion that the enterprise is a failure, while others contend that the closing down is for the purpose of depressing the tin district and buying more property. It is known that the company has bonds on about fifty claims in the vicinity of their group. Not a great while ago a certain Englishman, who took \$150,000 worth of stock in the com-pany, and who is largely interested in tin property at Cornwall, in conversation with a well known and reliable Black Hiller, frankly asserted that the Harney works would not produce any great quantity of tin until the tariff be removed by congress, or until the Cornwall mines are worked out. He said there is plenty of tin in the Black Hills, and is of very fine quality.

May Be a Directory Row.

"Another theory is that there has been a ruction between the stockholders on the American side and the Britishers. "It is claimed that the Englishmen have furnished most of the capital, and that the New York stockholders were made the officers and management to evade the law, and that the management has been extravagant, and now the Englishmen propose to have something to say. The extravagant local management has been frequently commented upon, and it is a fact that besides Chief Engineer Wilsie, who has drawn a salary of \$7,000 a year, there have been three other engineers in the office who have cost nearly \$10,000 more, and that there hasn't been work enough done for one man. In other ways we learn the company has been under

much expense.
It is said that during the operations for the past two months and a half the only ore reduced has been taken from the Addle, Gertie and Tenderfoot workings, the richest ore yet found; that instead of developing the low grade workings, reducing the ore there-from and bringing up the average with the high grade ore, no attempt was made to open new workings.
Another Clam.

"Elmer Capel, one of the engineer corps of the Harney Peak Tin company, arrived in the city yesterday on his way to Belle Fourche. To a Times reporter he said he could not explain the cause of the shut down of the company's works. Whether because his lips were scaled by his superiors or because he didn't dare to tell, we were unable to learn. He did say, however, that the shut down was not a complete one. It is true the mine and mill employes were discharged. This includes the high salaried officers, with the possible exception of Superintendent Childs. The men who before the close down were excavating for the foundations of the smelter and drying room were not discharged, and from the looks at present will not be, at least not before the contract is completed. The pumps are, with the exception of one, which was taken out yesterday for repairs, still in operation. "Some claim it is for the purpose of dusting Superintendent Childs, who works at variance with the will of the directors. He has often been heard to remark that he would have his own way in running the property, and, from all that can be learned, he did it. RESULTS OF TRRIGATION.

OMAHA, Feb. 6 .- To the Editor of THE BEE: In your editorial on "Irrigation in Nebraska," which appeared in the edition of the 4th inst., you rely upon the census bulletin for the figures given. The statistics there compiled were based upon the area irrigated in 1889. The method adopted in obtaining them was so unsatisfactory that it is not at all surprising that they fell far short of the fact, and knowing of so many instances in which this discrepancy occurred I feel tempted to make a few comments to supplement the good work your article is calculated to foster.

Mr. Newell, who had charge of this branch of the census, expressly says in his bulletins that "the information was derived from correspondence with irrigators and owners of canals and ditches by means of special irrigation schedules sent to all parts of the west and that it was not possible in this way to ob-tain exact statements." I received one of his schedules, and among other questions was the cost of the canal in which I am in-terested and the price of water rights. As terested and the price of water rights. As the canal was incomplete the cost could only have been guessed and the price of a water right had not been agreed on, so not being prepared or willing to answer these, I neglected to answer any That enterprise has since been completed and has reclaimed 50,000 acres in western Nebraska. Again, the statistics are based on the prepared agreement. on the irrigated acreage actually cultivated, which gives but an imperfect idea of the work of reclamation even then accomplished, because a man who owned a water right to a quarter section of land under a canal but recently completed would have probably not to exceed forty acres under cul-

The special bulletin for Wyoming from which you took your figures and which showed 229,670 acres irrigated and cultivated in 1889 also showed that canals were then completed covering 1,506,850 acres. So also the bulletin for Colorado gave less than 900, 000 acres cultivated in 1889, when the report of the state engineer for same year showed over 2,000,000 acres cultivated and nearly 4,000,000 more under ditch. The number of acres, therefore, credited to Nebraska for that year were, I feel confident in saying, equally as far below the mark. But whatever the fact may have been in 1889, the remarkable progress made in the three years since that time shows the great interest which the subject has awakened. Western Nebraska lags far behind the other states within the said belt, yet I can name on my fingers completed en-terprises on the North Platte river alone

which cover over 200,000 acres.

Nor do you suggest a tithe of the advantages of irrigation when you say that the farmer's crop is thereby assured. That is much, I admit, but the yield is also increased from four to six times as much; the quality drying concentrates before shipping. The furnace will be built as fast as possible. Colorado, for instance, is known as a mineral producing state and agriculture is not thought of in connection with it, and yet within the past few few years so rapid has been the spread of her irrigation system that though her mineral output last year reached the enormous sum of \$15,000,000, yet her agricultural and heart its state. tural and horticultural product, both wholly dependent on irrigation, amounted to but a fraction less than \$50,000,000 in value.

The vast population supported by this method of agriculture in other countries is a startling fact to an American and which illustrates, too, the increased yield produced by it. There is a canal in China over 700 miles long, which was constructed before the Christian era and is still in operation, which supports along it banks the densest population per square mile on the face of the globe.

Again, in India. The province of Punjab
has an area of 106,632 square miles, or about
one-third more than the state of Nebraska; of this area 36,755 square miles only are cul-tivated—that being the area under ditch, and less than one-half the area of Nebraska; yet it supports a population of over 22,000,000 of people, or one-third of the total popula-tion of the United States.

The interest in irrigation that is now so

rapidly growing, both among farmers and investors, will seen awaken the nation to the fact that the great American desert is. its mos' profitable portion, capable of sus-taining the largest population and destined to acquire the greatest aggregate wealth of any section of the United States.
