Pork Broke Nearly One Dollar Per Barrel Early Yesterday.

FEW OUTSIDE ORDERS WERE RECEIVED

Corn Was Supported by Some Covering by the Shorts - Wheat Trading Was of a Restricted Character-Stocks and Bonds.

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 24. A break of nearly \$1 per barrel took place today in the price of pork. From \$19.10, last night's closing figures. the market foll to \$18.2214, closing at \$18.25. The speculative branch of the trade has been in the hands of scalpers for several days, no outside orders having been received. The big plungers took advantage of this condition of things and organized a victous raid. They found the market poorly supported, and pressed their advantage with vigor, bringing out a lot of property on stop loss orders and precipitating a violent flurry. The closing price marks a decline of \$2 a barrel in pork from the outside price made on the recent advance. The slump was a Board of Trade affair entirely, the hog market at the stock yards feeling the effects of the raid only slightly. It was looked upon by many as the long looked for beginning of the end of the buil campaign in provisions.
