FOR MILLIONS OF POUNDS.

Collapse of the Commercial Bank at Melbourne.

MELBOURNE, April 4.—The Commercial Bank of Australia has suspended payment. The concern has been in bad shape for some time and the collapse was expected. The bank has paid up capital of £1,200,000, undrawn capital of £9,000,000 and a reserve of £100,000. It has branches in London, Edinburgh, Glasgow and the principal cities of Australia.

The suspension of the Commercial bank of Australia is due to the continued withdrawal of deposits of £10,000,000 having been withdrawn since January 1, 1893, and £6,000,000 since the last month.

The Commercial bank in Victoria and belonged to an association of banks which recently agreed to uphold each other with the assistance of the government. The total amount of the deposits is over £10,000,000 of which £5,000,000 are lodged in London.
