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IN AN ABANDONED SHAFT

How Two Prospectors Tumbled Onto a For-

tune in Colorado.

RESULT OF A FALL IN THE NIGHT

It did not take long to find an eastern purchaser, who willingly took a half inerest in behalf of the company he represented, and who paid all expenses for future development, etc., leaving the other half interest to the original discoverers. The claim did not disappoint them, as it is today one of the most paying flosino veins in the Saguache range. Its original owner was never heard from, but it had probably been abandoned for lack of funds to work it, the fate of so many good claims in the same section. Gilbert Graydon and Digby Foster returned to their Vermont homes richer, both in experience and this world's goods, and are today the leading law firm in a prominent Vermont city. Such was the actual history of two young prospectors.
