BEAUTIFUL TO SEE.

The Summer Home of President and Mrs. Cleveland. "Beautiful to see" is the free place which of Belvoir, the name of the place which the President and Mrs. Cleveland are to make their summer home. This is the original name. It is better known to the present generation as the Middle-ton house. Originally there were 101 acres in the estate but now there are only forty-five. This is the most beautiful view of the country to be found in the suburbs of Washington. A long winding carriage-way leads up to the old-fashioned entrance. After ascending four or five steps the visitor finds himself on a small porch, from which a low door leads into the corridor. Immediately to the right of the door, as you enter is a flight of steps to the next floor. There is a double arch at the foot of the stairs ornamented with fretwork, one of the arches forming what might be called an entrance to the staircase and the other leading to the dining room and thence to the parlor. The dining room porch at the rear of the house commands a magnificent view of Washington, which lies below it, and on a clear day the Potomac may be seen for miles. The apartment upon which Mrs. Cleveland expects to bestow the most attention is the main parlor. It is a large circular in shape and will, it is said, be finished in white and gold. A door leads from this into the library, where Mr. Cleveland will probably spend a good deal of his time, as those who have not done so expect that he will stop working even during the summer "vacation." Belvoir is only four miles from the white house, and this will enable the president to reach the executive mansion in about twenty-five minutes. Another advantage of the place is that it influenced the choice of the place for a summer home is the fact that this region is full of squirrels, and the president during his summer sojourns at "Red Top," which is only a short distance away, was fond of going into the woods and hunting and a couple of his friends similarly enjoying themselves. An important reason of all, however, for the selection of this place was the fact that it was just suited to the needs of Baby Ruth on account of its extensive grounds and pure atmosphere. There is an abandoned shaft in the front of the place to be built for Miss Ruth's special benefit on a little knoll immediately south of the house. The place will not be ready for occupancy for several weeks. The mansion was built by one of the Kentucky families in the last century with bricks imported from Europe as the brickmaking industry was not yet developed in this country. Francis Scott Key, author of "The Star-Spangled Banner," spent most of his youth there, and his name still stands carved in one of the windows frames in the front hall. Several presidents have made Belvoir their summer home, including Van Buren, Tyler and Buchanan.
