

IN A HONDURG-NICARAGUAN FIGHT.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.-Mr. James A Rankin, agent for the Central line of steamers, who arrived from Nicaragua on the Miranda, gave to a reporter of the Associated press the following account of a recent battle between the Nicaraguans and

Hondurans: "On January 27 a lively battle occurred at Cape Cracois, on the River Wanko, which divides the two countries, between the troops of Honduras and Nicaragua. Among the killed was an American licutenant. George Strong, who was a very dashing and theorge strong, who was a very dashing and brilliant soldier. Strong in 1859 and 1899 was a higher in the Seventh regiment, United States cavalry, and participated in the famous "Wounded Knee" fight against the Sloux Indians. Seven Americans were, wounded. Their names are: Major J. W. Wright, Captain Albert Wehde, O. C. Griffin, C. Lewis, C. Haneen, J. McClintie and George Palmer, A number of the other troops on both sides were killed."


### An Ingenious Fraudulent Ticket.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 20.-An ingenious fraudulent ticket has been ticketed by, George de Haven, general passenger agent of the Detroit, Lansing & Northern railway, whose circulars describing it have been sent to all passenger agents. The tickets were printed for and delivered to a Columbus broker. They are on bright yellow glazed surface paper and but one coupon. One thousand were delivered for scalping purposes between Columbus and large commercial centers. The tickets would be made to read to some point beyond the destination of the pasenger, and the holder furnished with a rebate order which, upon presentation and surrender of the ticket to the broker at the intermediate point, would be benored for the stipulated amount. The ticket being to a point beyond the passenger's destination would simply be punched and left with the passenger. On
