major portion of the state, and if these recur at intervals of a week will give Nebranka one of the biggest crops of corn in its history, the acrenge being considerably increased during the past two weeks by the failure of the small grain crops in some sections of the country. |

The following concise weekly crop report has been prepared in the office of the general manager of the Burlington & Missouri River railway as showing the condition of crops on that system:

On the western division the conditions are not very much changed over what they were when the report was made a week aro. They had heavy local showers east of Holdrege, Oxford and Oberlin, and between Mc-Donald and St. Francis since last report. These showers helped the appearance of corn in these sections, but were too late to do small grain any good. Pavorable weather from now on will make a corn ctop

on that division. On the northern division they have had local showers in nearly every locality dur-ing the past week, and much benefit has resulted. Some of the reports show that 700 oats that would have been plowed up will be allowed to stand since the recent rains, and that there is a chance for a part of a crop, but this condition is not general on the northern division. Small grain generally is practically ruined, and we have only the corn crop to rely on. In some localities the acreage of corn is estimated to be 25 per cent more than in previous years. Corn acreage is certainly very heavy.

Detailed report by countles and stations on the southern and Wyoming divisions: NEBRASKA.

ALONG THE UNION PACIFIC.

The freight department of the Union Pa-cific gives the following: Small grains will make about 65 per cent of an ordinary yield as far west as Columbus and on the Norfolk branch. On the branches west of the Norfolk line, leading to Cedar Rapids and Albion, there will be a very light wheat and oats crop; probably 40 per cent west of Genom and Fullerton; at Genom and Fullerton, about 50 per cent. In the territory west of Cotumbus and on the branches north of Grand island and Kearney the small grain crop is very light, not above 25 or 30 per cent of an ordinary yield, but a 25 per cent increase in acreage. West of Kearney we get the in survey with the points on small grain; probably total failure. In the territory south of Valdley, as far as Wahoo, small grain prospects are good. West of Wahoo, south to the Kansas line and to Strom burg, 50 per

ent of the ordinary yield. Corn got a very carly start everywhere in the state and was coming along nicely until the dry, hot weather during the closing days of May. Since then it has been at a standstill until Saturday and Sunday last. Good rains are

touching all points in the state this week. Corn is free from weeds and will make unusual progress from this on everywhere east of Sidney. Conditions in Nebraska along the Rock Island have increased considerably during the past twenty-four hours, owing to the generous fall of rain between Murdock and Fairbury, the fail being anywhere from a half to two inches. Nelson, Clay Center and

#### IGNATIUS DONNELLY.

#### What Omaha People Expect from His Lecture this Evening.

The approuncement that Hon. Ignatius Donnelly would lecture tonight at Exposition hall on the very interesting subject. "The Signs of the Times," has aroused considerable local interest in the orator and statesman from Minnesota, and it is guite probable that the large hall will be crowded onight with an appreciative Omaha audience. 




